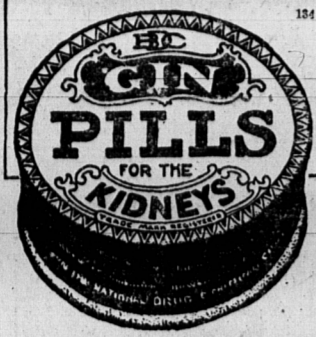

Legislative Assembly

Prince Edward Island

Rules Relating to Private Bills.

36. All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

37. No Private Bill shall be brought into the House but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38. A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum to be denominated "The Private Bills Committee" to whom shall be referred every private Bill and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

39. No bill for the particular interests of any person or persons, Corporation of Corporations or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House.

40. No bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body corporate the title of any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least four weeks notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this province of the Municipality or body Corporate to apply for such Bill.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for certain conditions.

1. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in five of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house in or near the homestead is required.

2. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 cents extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

3. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The six months residence is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

HOW EXPLOSIONS ACT

An explosion is a sudden expansion of a substance like gunpowder or some elastic fluid or other substance that has the power to explode under certain conditions with force and usually a loud report. Some explosions are comparatively mild and accompanied by a very mild noise, while others are very powerful and accompanied by a very loud noise.

When an explosion occurs, the air and everything surrounding the thing that explodes is very much disturbed. The air surrounding the thing that explodes is thrown back in air waves which are powerful in the exact proportion in which the explosion is powerful. These air waves can be so suddenly thrown back against the objects in the vicinity that not only the windows in the building are broken, but often the entire building blown away. The explosion acts in all directions at once with equal force. A great hole may be torn in the earth beneath the explosion. If there is anything over the explosion, that is blown away unless its power, of resistance is sufficient to withstand the power of the explosion. Then, also, the air surrounding on all sides is forced back against everything in its path.

Very often this air, which is suddenly forced by the power of the explosion, is thrown against houses, at a distance. These houses may also be so strongly built as to be able to withstand the effect of the explosion, but still certain parts, for example, such as the windows and the bricks of the chimney, may not be able to withstand this sudden pressure of air against them and they are forced in.

The wind from such an explosion acts on the outside of the windows just the same as though you stood on the outside with your hands against the windows and pushed them in. Anything that is thrown against a window with more force than the window glass can resist will break the window, and even slight explosions may be so powerful as to throw the air back and away from them with such force as to break windows at a great distance—even a mile or more away.

TEN ISLAND BOYS RETURNED SATURDAY

Among the 1,300 Canadians who returned from England recently there were ten Islanders at least, and they arrived in the City Saturday for the S. S. Aramibo.

Sergeant Victor Saunders, son of Mr. John Saunders, of Saunders, New-Some and Co., City, has been in the Army Postal Service for nearly two years. He has been ill for some time past and was invalided home.

Mr. John T. Strain, son of the late Mr. James Strain, City and a nephew of Mr. Frank Connolly, City, and Mrs. C. J. Whitlock, Elm Ave., Gunner Strain was attached to the 2nd Siege Battery under Major J. W. St. Stanley, and was badly gassed on June 22nd last. His brother, James, was reported wounded last week.

Mr. Noah Garnham, a brother of Messrs. Brent and George Garnham, City, was in Major MacKinnon's battery and is suffering from shell shock. He left the City Saturday for Charlottetown where his home is.

Pte. Charles Carmody, son of Mr. Joseph Carmody, City, enlisted in Montreal in the 24th, and spent 17 months in France. On December 28th, 1916, he received a gunshot wound in the leg at the Battle of the Somme, and spent three months in hospital.

Pte. Benjamin Clow, son of Mr. J. Clow, Pictou, Private Clow now of the 14th Battalion left here with the 105th, At the Battle of Vimy Ridge in February last, he was wounded in the leg and hand with shrapnel. He was buried in the trench and was unconscious for five hours.

Pte. Stewart and Pte. J. D. Baytoll, Richmond also returned. These latter men were members of the 105th and have been invalided home from England.

Office of the Food Controller, Ottawa.

WHEREAS by Order in Council Number 2688, dated the eleventh day of October, 1917, it was provided among other things as follows:—

1. The Food Controller for Canada may, from time to time, require the producers and manufacturers in wholesale quantities and wholesale dealers in any particular article or articles of food specified by such Controller to furnish him with statements in such form and on or before such date or dates as such Controller may from time to time prescribe, containing all or any of the following particulars:—

(a) Their names and addresses; (b) Any information that the said Controller may require with respect to the purchases, sales, shipments, origin, destination or prices of the specified article or articles of food, produced, purchased or sold by such wholesale producers, manufacturers or dealers.

(c) The capacity, dimension and equipment of any premises occupied or used by any such wholesale producers, manufacturers or dealers.

Any person neglected or refusing to furnish the said Food Controller with any information demanded by such Controller under the above regulations, or wilfully furnishing any incorrect or false statements of information, shall be guilty of an offense and shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding one thousand dollars, or to imprisonment for any period not exceeding three months, or to both fire and imprisonment.

AND WHEREAS, by said Order, the Food Controller is given power to require wholesale dealers to furnish certain information respecting their names, addresses and dimensions of premises used or occupied by such dealers.

AND WHEREAS, it is deemed advisable to make the following Order.

THEREFORE I do hereby order that all wholesale dealers dealing in potatoes on the Island of Prince Edward, furnish to the office of the Food Controller forthwith, on forms to be provided by the Food Controller, and in the manner prescribed by such forms:—

(a) Their names and addresses; (b) The capacity and dimensions of premises occupied or used by such dealers; (c) All other information required by such prescribed forms.

2. That all wholesale dealers in potatoes on the Island of Prince Edward, file with the office of the Food Controller on such forms, weekly reports covering all purchases and sales of potatoes made by such dealers, on and after the twenty-fifth day of November, 1917.
