THAT SIX TO ONE WIN OVER THE CALGARY "TIGERS"

Taken from the Star, the following story of the first Canadian-California game should prove of interest to Island hockey fans:

When Howie Morenz scored the second goal for the Canadians in their first game for the Stanley Cup against the Calgary Tigers on Saturday and skated back to his place at centre, Billy Bouché skated after him and hit him a heavy and friendly slap with his stick across the back, meaning in the unwritten language of hockey:

"Good for you, old boy. Keep it up."

From this one would judge that whatever the rumors to the contrary may have been friendship and harmony reigns in the Canadian camp.

Their team work when they got a chance to use it on Saturday was good and in every respect they had the best of the match, though at times, particularly in the first period, the Tigers kept them busy.

The lack of practice on the part of the latter owing to the fear of having the honeycombed ice cut up too much, no doubt was a drawback; for a week's inactivity on the part of a team tells heavily against them and they may do better on hard ice after Saturday's chance to get their ice legs again.

That there was skatable ice at all, speaks highly for the arena management and its ice-makers, it was better than on Thursday.

Thanks to the horse-drawn ice-chaser, which had been lent by the Ottawa Auditorium management, the surface was smooth and hard at the start, though as a matter of course the gathering of the seven or eight thousand people who had again come to see the match increased the temperature to such an extent that it soon became soft and heavy.

And the effort of cutting through it, visibly told.

Soft ice told on both sides, and most perhaps on the visitors who undoubtedly did not run up in the course of their season against vigorous, fast, finished opponents of the calibre it has been the pleasure of Canadians to bat the against all winter.

The Tigers did their best. Any one could see that. During the first period, they had their opponents puzzled and made wary by their strenuous checking and poke checking. But their best was not good enough.

Over the Canadians had taken their measure in that first period. The home team threw caution to the winds and sailed in and the score tells the result.

Although the game was slow at times there were many exciting features. How earnestly the visitors

took their work was shown when upon one occasion a Canadian player scored and one of the Calgary forwards thinking it had not gone in, caught the puck as it was swept out, and carried it well over towards the Canadian net before he realized that his team had lost another point. So honestly was he convinced that no goal had been scored, that he complained to Referee Ross, who perforce had to consult the Umpire. The latter confirmed the fact that the puck had rested a sufficient space of time back of the goal line to be counted.

There was some great scrimmaging near both goals and in the course of these, Veizina of the Canadians was an absolute icicle compared to Reid of Calgary, who like Lehman of Vancouver, has the nervous habit of rushing out to meet the puck, which in one instance, in the second period gave the Canadians a grand chance to tally.

Great Scrimmages.

The only time that Veizina seemed really worried was in the third period, when Gardiner of the Calgary Defence made a very fine rush in his favour, which he carried towards the end of the second period, and had done great work at other times during the match. So Veizina came "loose" of him, but when he came the Canadian Defence which at that time with a generous margin in their favor, was really playing a defence game, presented a solid front which no feints or strategy or stick-handling could swerve from its purpose.

The Canadians were good in every department, even the substitute and although both sides fought it remarkably, that considering the heavy going, which always irritates, there was so little underhand work.

It was only towards the end of the contest that a man on each side was ruled out.

Taught Him His Place.

A rather amusing incident took place in the third period. One of the Calgary team, having become exasperated, "died" they call it in the vernacular, at Coutu's success in stopping rushes, by the enemies' and adding rushes of his own side, he made a diversion amongst the said enemies, so as to secure a free field for whoever tried to score, on the Canadian side, made up his mind to do something to the big Canadian defence man, and actually struck him across the head, though the blow was high and did not seem to have much force behind it. Referee Ross did not see it, so Coutu who was much bigger than his assailant, took the law in his own hands, and hit him on the top of the head with his open glove, as if he wanted to shove him through the ice.

The first man to be ruled out was Billy Bouché.

The veterans of the Calgary team like Crawford, Wilson and Oatman, all well known in Montreal, received pleasant recognition from the crowd.

Each of the Canadian forwards scored and so did Sprague Clesghorn, whose self contained unselfish demeanor again showed him to be a most capable captain.

His brother Odie, in at least one instance was very much responsible for a goal that was scored and Coutu who didn't score a goal was great on the defence.

The large crowd though not so widely excited as on other similar occasions, perhaps because their confidence in the home team was too firm, was good-natured and enthusiastic and seemed to go home more than satisfied.

TWENTY PAGERS EXPECTED TO ENTER DERBY

Actual Value of Race Will Exceed \$30,000. Will Be Held July 24, During Annual Grand Circuit Meeting.

KALAMAZOO, Mich., March 26.—The \$25,000 American Pacing Derby, the biggest pacing event ever raced in America, has attracted 43 nominations of the best known 2:08 performers in the country. The Derby will be held over the Recreation Park track here July 24, during the annual Grand Circuit meeting.

At least 20 horses are expected to start. The 43 nominations are from 17 states and two Canadian provinces, and represent all the best known stables.

Grand Circuit officials now believe the actual value of the race will exceed \$30,000. The money will be divided 70 percent to the winner, 20 percent to second place and 10 percent to the show horse.
