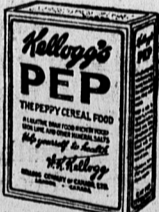

## CHARLOTTETOWN BUSINESS COLLEGE; RESULTS OF TERM ENDING JUNE, 1927

### Results Of Term Ending June 1927.

While the regular work of the 1926-7 term of the Charlottetown Business College was terminated on June 1st—thus releasing a large number of students for holidays or employment—yet, it has been found impossible to issue a report of the work of the term until the present, and even now evening examinations are being held to accommodate those who were sent to employment before completing their finals. Some few years ago the management established a rule that any student who had completed his or her examinations satisfactorily up to a certain average of proficiency, and was sent to employment from the classroom, said student would be granted a certificate on the written recommendation of the employer stating that the student was giving entire satisfaction. In other words: As our finals are efficiency tests, it will be generally admitted that no person is in a better position to judge than the employer who had practical knowledge of the accomplishment of the student employed. This has been found to work exceedingly well, in as much as it not only saves much time and money to the student, but also facilitates the work of the college. Where the student has been engaged but a short time—this rule does not apply—hence examinations at such hours as will best accommodate the employed. For this reason the report has been delayed, and even now final examinations are being held.

The term 1926-7 may well be classed as one of the most busy in the long history of the college. Not only has the attendance been a record one, but the results have been most gratifying. A large number have been prepared for the activities of life's work, and those already engaged are proving the wisdom in granting them graduation. Others will do the same. The cut in September is exceedingly bright, and a glance at the report will show that the term will start with splendid material. Extra teachers for special work are already being arranged for, and there are special reasons why 1927-8 should be, as it will—THE BEST in the history of this institution.
