### FIGHTING PARSON

The by-election in Chertsey is proving lively. Though the Unionist candidate, Sir Philip Richardson, has deprecated the introduction of personalities into the contest, some of his supporters are less reticent, notably Rev. C. P. Edwards, known as the fighting parson, and winner of the Military Cross. He attacked the handling of the fifth army in France by Gen. Sir Hubert Gough, the Liberal candidate, and in evening papers yesterday Gen. Gough replied to the allegations made against him, which he states were founded "on gossip and scandal." Gen Gough says he was made the scapegoat by Premier Lloyd George when the confidence of the people had been shaken by Lloyd George's military adventures on other fronts. He proclaims himself a free trader. The Chertsey by-election is due to the vacancy caused by the death of Sir Donald MacMaster, K. C.

### JAZZ AND SHORT SKIRTS

PORTLAND, March 15—"Jazz" short skirts and bobbed hair are not immoral—from the standpoint of Right Reverend Benjamin Brewster, Episcopal Bishop of Maine, who resides in this City.

"Jazz music" is only a temporary craze he told a newspaper reporter. "Short skirts" are good because they are very convenient for walking, but they should not be too short. Young women are no more consciously immodest than they used to be. They are not going back to long skirts that drag in the dust. There is no possible suggestion of immorality in "bobbed hair," he declared.

"In the long run we are getting better," he said, in answer to a query as to the trend of morals.

"But we have many evils to fight. Among other things, loose ideas in regard to marriage and divorce. Current ideas of the family must be corrected. People enter into marriage without due consideration and think they can break off the relation at any time. The signs point to a wave of deterioration in that respect. The family is not held in as high esteem as it should be. Children are not taught to obey their parents as they should."

"This is one of the most serious evils confronting us today. I trust in Christian circles to establish strong sentiment against loose ideas of marriage and perhaps better legislation will make it more difficult to obtain divorces. Separation should not be granted merely because man and wife become tired of each other. Marriage is for better or for worse. "Public morals," he continued, "perhaps have received a certain temporary setback from the war. Crime and violence have increased since then—not so much around
