Newspapers are not the only sufferers of the present paper shortage. The circus is likewise suffering from the inadequate supply and much difficulty is being experienced in obtaining the bright lithographs, which announce the coming of the show to the delight of both young and old. The majestic Hagenbeck-Wallace Circus which is to exhibit here on Saturday, July 10 and at Summerside the previous day has experienced much difficulty this season. The large stock of paper heretofore so prominent on the advance cars, is not in evidence this season and the supply is declared to be billed as fast as it arrives. According to the circus agent, the Hagenbeck-Wallace Circus is suffering more than other tented shows. It seems in all the large printing and lithographing plants there are large supplies of stock lithographs, but this show is placing newly designed paper upon the boards and in the windows this season and the plant is handicapped in securing fresh paper for the Hagenbeck-Wallace people. However, the entire island is ablaze with the bright, snappy posters heralding the news of the show's coming. The like of which never was done, judging from the quantity of the outdoor billing, the circus shows its immense size long before its coming. And when it does get here we will find that it is the greatest wild animal circus in the world. The lithographs and banners this year picture many new and novel trained animal acts, which construct part of the circus program. European novelties are also advertised, as well as the large

menagerie, declared to be one of the most complete in the world. A free street parade, is another of the features advertised. The Hagenbeck-Wallace Circus will exhibit at Upper Queen and Connolly Streets both matinee and night, and during its stay here a downtown ticket office will be opened at Roldin Bros. Drugstore.

The Old Gardener

There is still plenty of time to plant gladiolus bulbs. There are few more useful garden flowers. Look through your perennial beds and wherever there is a vacant space put in a few bulbs, taking care, however, to choose colors which will harmonize with adjacent flowers. It will be well to use a little garden fertilizer in order to push the plants along rapidly. The bulbs should go in about four inches deep. If you have never tried the Primulus hybrids put in a few of these bulbs. They are among the daintiest flowers which grow, and unexcelled for cutting.

Democratic Convention Opens In Frisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 29.—The Democratic National Convention today will elect Senator Joseph Robinson of Arkansas, chairman, in accordance with the recommendation of the permanent organizing committee.
