ROYAL BANK ROLLING UP BIG PROFITS

Shows Over 17 Per Cent And Heavy Increases in All Items And

Reflects The Prosperity of The Country And Makes An Excellent Showing.

The banks continue to reflect the prosperity of the country by rolling up big profits.

The Royal Bank's annual statement appears today. It shows marked progress all along the line.

That the profits on the average capital exceed 17 per cent, must be considered a most satisfactory showing, and the increase in deposits of over \$4,000,000 in the best possible indication of the bank's growth.

A substantial amount has been written off bank premises account, and it will be noted with interest that \$73,000 has been appropriated from profits in order to write down to 80 the bank's large holding of British consols.

The present quotation for consols being 87, this may be considered ultra conservative by some, but the general manager, Mr. Frazer, has evidently decided that in the time of prosperity it behooves the careful banker to set his house in order.

The net earnings for the year amount to \$404,465, while \$900,000 premium was received on the new stock, bringing the total up to \$1,304,465.

The bank's quick assets amount to \$21,578,007, while public deposits are close to \$32,000,000.
