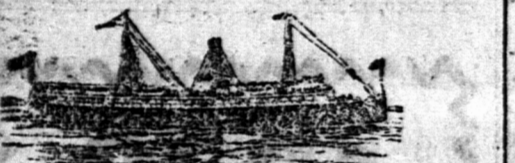

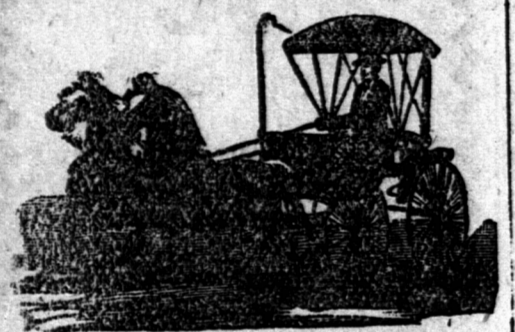

CANADIAN TRADE

The recently published trade figures for the Dominion for the fiscal year recently closed are both interesting and assuring. The volume of our export and import trade was very large, breaking all records, making a total of \$394,000,000, and showing an excess of 12 millions over the previous year, which had been far higher than any previous high water mark. As usual the great bulk of our growing trade was with the Mother Country and the United States.

In a table showing the commerce of twenty-six nations Canada now stands eleventh in the order of volume, only exceeded by the United Kingdom, United States, France, Germany, the Netherlands, Belgium, Austro-Hungary, India, Russia and Italy. In fact Italy's trade is but little in excess of Canada's trade. China and Japan with their teeming millions of population have each less trade than Canada. Switzerland, Sweden and Norway, Spain, Denmark and Turkey, with many others trail behind us in a diminishing line. We have two thirds as much trade as Austria Hungary, with its 40 millions of people, and nearly two thirds as much as India with its 300 millions.

The Dominion must inevitably become one of the great commercial nations of the earth. With our splendid advantages of position, looking out upon the Atlantic and the Pacific, the nearest land to Europe on the east and Asia on the west, with our vast natural resources in the soil, the forest the mine and the sea, and peopled by a race endowed with the commercial instinct—with all these conditions in our favour, nothing but the hand of heaven or our own folly can stay our commercial and industrial progress. The annual stock-taking gives us every reason to face the future with renewed hope and confidence.

By the earlier terms of peace offered to the Boers they might, had they accepted them, have retained the joint use of their language with the English in the Courts, the Legislature and the schools. But that time has apparently passed. In the schools now being set up English alone will be taught.

Manitoba's wheat crop estimates are still going up. Forty, fifty and even sixty and sixty-five millions of bushels of wheat have been spoken of as the possible yield. No doubt the latter estimates are away beyond the mark, while still the outlook is a splendid and unprecedented one. The fact that last year's crop was considered a failure, and yet the farmers this year sowed more largely than ever before, showed their resolute and abiding confidence. This year's crop has justified their trust. The one danger yet to be passed is from the summer frosts, but early sowing this year has made the harvest ready in advance of the time when the frost usually comes.

The famous tuberculosis Congress is now in session in London and before it Dr. Koch has delivered a remarkable address, affirming that tuberculosis in the human race and in cattle is not the same disease. He is satisfied that these respective maladies are not transmissible from men to animals or vice versa. It is greatly to be hoped that the eminent scientist is right. Dr. Koch, now 58 years of age was the discoverer of the bacilli of tuberculosis in 1882, and of cholera in 1883. There is no more eminent bacteriologist in the world. His views must command attention everywhere, and will serve to greatly relieve the apprehension of infection from milk and meat. At the same time Dr. Koch believes that heredity is a strong factor in transmitting tuberculosis. This is contrary to the more recent conclusions of other scientific men.

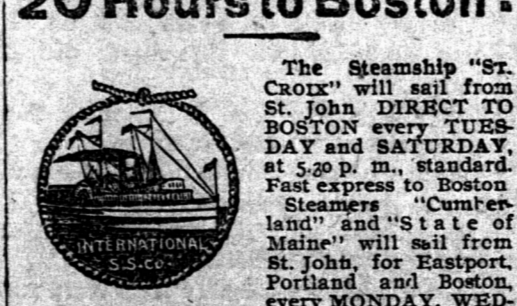
