### Beavers Arrive In Capital

OTTAWA, March 22 — Players and officials of the Saint John Beavers, Maritime senior amateur hockey champions, received a hearty welcome today when they arrived in the capital to resume the Allan Cup series with Hull tonight. The third game of the series is scheduled for tomorrow night.

Fourteen persons made up the party, including 11 players, Coach Dick Carroll, manager Murray Long and Trainer Bill Oliver. H. L. Marcus, president of the club, accompanied the party as far as Montreal, and will be in town for the game tomorrow. Mayor D. L. McLaren of Saint John is also expected to be present.

The players were: Bill Dickie, Charlie Phillips, "Ham" Riley and Vince Livingston, defence; "Boots" Baird and Eddie Price, centres; Matt Kelley and Bill Givner, left wingers; Jimmy Russell and Eddie Burke, right wingers and Gordon Marshall, utility.

Winner of the first two games of the best-in-five series, the Maritime champions are confident of making it three straight tomorrow night and entering a best-in-three series with Toronto Goodyears.

The Beavers held a practice this afternoon at the Auditorium, where tomorrow night's game will be played. Tomorrow they will be entertained at a civic luncheon.

All was serene in the camps of Charlottetown Royals and Perth Blue Wings last night as the two strong junior squads rested for the second game of their Memorial Cup playdown series tonight at the Forum with the Blue Wings in the favored spot after taking a convincing 6-2 victory in the opening game on Tuesday night.

Undaunted by the 4-0 pasting his Amerks took from Toronto's Maple Leafs, Dutton the Red for once had little to say, but what he did roll off his tongue was decisive and to the point.

Homebound bound for the second clash of the best-of-three series, he of the flaming locks announced: "We've got one to go and they'll know they've been in a game before it's over."

Injured Earl Robertson, regular goalie, would remain again on the sidelines, it was expected, and Alhe Moore will climb back into New York's netminding harness.

Patrick's New York Rangers, downed 2-1 by Boston after 59 minutes and 26 seconds of overtime in a game that started their best-of-seven fight, and Adams' Detroit Red Wings, set back 2-0 before the goaltending wizardry of Canadiens' rookie Claude Bourque, weren't worrying either—ostensibly, anyway.

"Bad breaks, that's what beat us," said Adams, herding his boys aboard the train for Detroit and the next stage of the best-of-three series. Return of Charlie Ombauer, out of the opener with a gashed leg, might cause Adams to drop Modere (Mud) Brunette, observers thought.

Possible loss of goalie Dave Kerr and wingman Bryan Hextall for the second fixture made Rangers' supporters none too optimistic, but Patrick was hopeful the first game's bruising play had worn the edge off Brunie, too.

Both Kerr and Hextall suffered bruised shoulders.

Manager Conny Smyth of Leafs, and Manager Jules Dugal of Canadiens, also had something to say about the next stage in the proceedings. Bruins' Art Ross cast an approving eye over his team's first-game showing and let it go at that.

"We're only won two of eight starts on New York ice this winter," said Smyth. "We're hoping this game will be the turning point of our luck down there, but we're not leaving with any idea of having an easy time with Red Dutton's gang."

Said Dugal: "We'll take Wings in two straight."

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In fact the majority of the fans who saw the opening game feel strongly that Royals if they are right can take the measure of the Ontario team. It is not an easy task at all but nevertheless one that the sold fans think the Maritime champions are fully capable of.

### Royals Win Game 6-1

MONTREAL, March 22 — (CP) — The power-laden Montreal Royals, Quebec Province senior hockey champions, did the expected tonight by throwing a 6-1 lacing into St. Jerome, provincial intermediate title, in the first game of the three-in-five provincial final leading to the Allan Cup playdowns.

However tonight will tell the story. Defeat for the Royals will mean the end of the trail for this year but only after having piled up an enviable record and one which the youthful squad should well be proud of. But, say the Royals we are not out yet.

Tuesday's game was considered by the majority to be the finest encounter of the season but judging by the attitude of both teams last night tonight's fray promises to be lots and lots better. There will not be testing each other out in the early stages. Both are going out there to play hockey from start to finish and what a battle it promises to be.

Royals need all the encouragement they can get and are certainly worthy of it and judging by the sale of tickets yesterday will get in lots. Fans are solidly behind the youngsters, which is as it should be, and the boys will not lack for vocal support tonight. So if you have any doubts about not attending the encounter cast them aside and be on hand early.

You will witness a fast and exciting brand of hockey that only juniors can play. In addition to the stakes are and in addition you will witness a gallant young band of Charlottetown youngsters making one glorious effort to still remain contenders for this year's Memorial Cup playdowns.

Perth will send the same lineup again the Royals, Truelove who was taken ill with a bad cold on arrival here was up and around yesterday but Coach Ombauer will not start him in tonight's game as he has not yet fully recovered, Royals with George McLeod replacing Aubin Bisquiere will ice the same squad that put up such a courageous fight in the first encounter.

But Wings were taken for a drive around the City yesterday and were very much in Government House, the Provincial Building where they showed a lot of interest in the Confederation Chamber; they also met His Worship Mayor Foster and Councilors and were escorted by Mayor F. W. Turner and several others who put their cars at the team's disposal.

The boys enjoyed their sight-seeing tour very much and Coach Ombauer last night on behalf of himself and his team wish to extend his sincere appreciation of the fine manner in which they are being treated.

The Stanley Cup playoffs have become as unpredictable as the regular schedule campaigning of many of the individual players and some of the teams. Major league baseball's World Series title guessing, in comparison, is a soft touch. There you have only two guesses. In hockey you start with six and wind up in a padded cell when you suddenly discover that a team such as the 1937-38 Black Hawks has captured it all.

### 40-1 Shot Winner Of Lincolnshire

LINCOLN, England, March 22—The Lincolnshire Handicap, always a great gamble, was won today by a 40-1 outsider, Scudron Castle, a six-year-old by Mr. Jinks out of Laverock, owned by the bookmaker, S. H. Oxenham.

His victory by 1-1-2 lengths over Mrs. G. A. Monkhouse's Halcyon Gift in the first big event of the 1939 flat-racing season helped out his owner's fellow bookmakers in a fairly heavy betting race.

The winner, first six-year-old to capture the event since the 100-1 outsider, King of Clubs, won in 1926, covered the mile in one minute, 48 seconds and in winning held off a strong challenge by Halcyon Gift. Sir Abe Bailey's Dark Tully, a neck behind, was third.

There cannot be two winners so a real clash is in the offing and it is fully expected that the game tonight will be witnessed by just as large a crowd as viewed the opening tussle. And the 200 fans on that occasion got their money's worth every minute. Tonight the game promises to be even more exciting as the Royals attempt to send the series into a third and deciding game and retain a chance of continuing on against the Quebec Province winners.
