—PROHIBITION.—The adjourn-
ed prohibition case of George S.
Barbour vs. a party from Northam
came up for argument, Saturday,
before Judge McQuarrie at the
Court House, Summerside. The
information in this case was laid
in Sept. 27, 1924. At the time ser-
vice of a summons could not be ef-
fected, the defendant having left
the province. The defendant was
served with a summons in April,
1925. The objection was that the
summons should have been is-
sued soon after the laying of the
information, and that the delay till
April was too long and prejudicial
to the defendant. The Judge held
that under the authorities that not
withstanding the delay the Court
had jurisdiction to issue the sum-
mons when it did and that all the
Prohibition Act requires is that the
information be laid within three
months after the commission of
offence, and that the Act puts no
limitation on the time within which
after receiving the information the
Court is to issue the summons or
warrant, and that further, no evi-
dence had been offered that the de-
fendant was prejudiced in his de-
fence by the delay. A witness hav-
ing deposed that he had obtained
intoxicating liquor from the defen-
dant between the dates mentioned
in the information, His Honor con-
victed the defendant and fined him
the sum of \$200 and in default of
payment three months in jail.

In the second case against the same
party the witness being still absent
from the province and no informa-
tion being ascertained as to when
he would return, the Judge declined
to adjourn the case further and ac-
cordingly dismissed the same. Mr.
Heath Strong appeared for the
prosecution and Mr. Ernest Strong
for the defendant.
