RAILWAYS WILL NOT AMALGAMATE

Idea Is Definitely Off So Far As Bennett Govt. And Parliament of Canada Is Concerned.

OTTAWA, Jan. 16.—Amalgamation of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways is definitely off so far as the Bennett Government and the Parliament of Canada are concerned. If for no other reason it is off because the Government knows amalgamation is politically and nationally impossible. Premier Bennett so far as one can learn has not deviated from his Winnipeg shibboleth of "amalgamation never, competition ever."

NEW LONDON, Conn., Jan. 17.—The coast guard destroyer Herndon, with pumps working continuously to keep some of her forward compartments dry and with a great hole in her side, rested safely at the destroyer pier today after a collision at sea and a successful battle with fog and darkness.

Three Killed In Religious Riot

BILBAO, Spain, Jan. 17.—(A.P.)—Three youths were killed and three were wounded today when Catholics and anti-Catholics came into conflict during a religious meeting presided over by a Catholic deputy. Civil guards charged the combatants and dispersed them after a general fight lasting an hour and greatly exciting the populace. During the melee a group of anti-Catholics pushed an automobile belonging to an adversary into the estuary. Others paraded through the streets singing the "Internationale."

Four Killed In Mountain Feud

LONDON, K. Y., Jan. 17.—Feud guns, which blazed because members of one family believed a member of the other clan had wronged their 17-year-old sister, have taken four lives, and today a fifth mountaineer was near death and a sixth slightly wounded.

Prince Refused Permission To Marry



ROYAL ROMANCE VETOED BY EX-KING ALFONSO

Ex-King Alfonso of Spain is reported to have vetoed the marriage of another of his children, this time the Prince Asturias, exiled heir to the Spanish throne. The prince, shown in (1) asked his father's consent to marry the beautiful Princess Kyra Cerelovna, second daughter of Grand Duke Vladimirovitch, (2) but the king is understood to have declined to sanction the union. The prince made the acquaintance of the princess, reputed to be the most beautiful Russian princess since Catherine the Great, in Madrid two years ago. The princess is of the Orthodox church, while the prince is a Roman Catholic. He still suffers from chronic Haemophilia which confines him to his room.

Japanese Wipe Out Irregulars

500 Chinese Almost Entirely Annihilated Near City Of Mukden—No Jap Casualties.

MUKDEN, Manchuria, Jan. 17.—(A.P.)—Japanese troops "almost entirely annihilated" 500 Chinese irregulars near Yentai, 25 miles south of Mukden today. A Japanese official communique said there were no Japanese casualties.

NOT GUILTY Many Persons Are Believed Killed In Wreck

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 17.—(By the Canadian Press)—Ben S. Edelson Saturday night was found not guilty of murdering Jack Horwitz, a fellow-jeweler, in Edelson's store on Nov. 24. Deliberating little more than an hour, a Supreme Court of Ontario winter assizes jury acquitted Edelson at 10:40 p.m. after a three-day trial.

Robbers Get Away With Much Loot

NEW YORK, N. Y., Jan. 17.—The home of Robert Le Roy, lawyer, occupying the entire eighth floor of 160 east 72nd street, was looted yesterday afternoon by a band of five armed robbers who escaped with jewelry valued at more than \$200,000, leaving three maid servants, and an elevator operator tied up with picture wire.

Planes Drop Food To Starving Navajo Indians

WINSLOW, Ariz., Jan. 17.—Six army bombing aeroplanes from Marchfield, Cal., took the air today in a mission of mercy to snowbound and suffering Navajo Indians of this district. By noon 10,800 pounds of rations had been dropped at widely separated points and the work continued.
