The Salada Tea Company, who are the largest dealers in North America, have been recently forced to increase the price of all their blends, in order to supply the same quality, when paying so much more for the unblended leaf.

Humble Hen Comes Into Her Own

OTTAWA, Feb. 23.—The once humble domestic hen has at last come into her own, and "registered hens" are to-day—in Canada—an established fact. By admitting the hen to registration Canada has taken leading place in world poultry matters, as no other country in the world has previously registered poultry under national records. The honor of having the first registered hen goes to Mr. Everett Howatt of Truro, P. E. I., whose white Leghorn pullet laid 21 eggs in 52 consecutive weeks in the laying contest conducted at Charlottetown. Being pure bred, typical of the breed free from disqualifications and laying a two cenced egg, her record and the record of any hen laying 200 eggs and over under similar conditions will from now on be accepted by the Canadian National Live-stock Records and the bird and her production duly registered.

The following seven birds have also been granted registration:

7. Barred Plymouth Rock bred by Culp's Poultry Farm, Berkey, Ontario, 281 eggs.
8. Barred Plymouth Rock bred by Neff Bros., Simcoe, Ont., 282 eggs.

Other birds have qualified and will be registered on receipt of the necessary application forms and fees.

The application for incorporation was made and signed by J. M. Caldwell, president, and Walter Russ secretary of the Ottawa Poultry Association; Fred King, Hope Poultry Farm, Billings Bridge; H. B. Donovan, Canadian Poultry Review, Toronto; Prof. W. R. Graham, Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, and Dr. Silvio Laforaine, Guelph, Ontario, Que.

Race Map For 1923

Sweetwater and Lafollette and in South Carolina at Columbia, Dillon, Spartanburg, Orangeburg, Greenville and Bishopville.

The patrons of the fairs in Georgia will be entertained in 1923 by the trotters and pacers at Albany, Moultrie, Columbus, LaGrange, Griffin, Valdosta and possibly Atlanta in Alabama there will be meetings at Dothan, Guntersville, Athens, Huntsville, Hartselle, Troy and Tusculumbia. From these points the light harness horses can in December move on to Florida where they can start at Jacksonville, Gainesville and Orlando where Lee Worthy and Jane Revere were prepared for their engagements last year.

The Canadian circuits will again prove important points in 1923 as they have in the past. In Quebec attractive programmes will be offered for the meetings at Sherbrooke, Three Rivers, Quebec, Richmond, Valleyfield and St. Scholastique. There will be racing in New Brunswick at Woodstock, Fredericton, St. Stephen, Moncton and Port Elgin and in Nova Scotia at Halifax, Glace Bay, Sydney, Truro, New Glasgow, Spring Hill and Oxford. There are fifteen active tracks on Prince Edward Island, the most important one being located at Charlottetown.

Ontario will contribute its portion to racing with meetings at Ottawa, Toronto, London, Kingston, Simcoe as well as the six day Grand Circuit meeting at Windsor. These with what are put on in Western Canada, together with the circuits in the middle west, completes the race map for 1923. The Pacific Coast will make its usual offering, California contributing meetings at Sacramento, Stockton, Riverside, Fresno, Los Angeles and Pleasanton; Oregon fairs at Salem, Gresham, Myrtle Point, Eugene and Albany; and Washington a series at Walla Walla, Cheshalis, Spokane, Elma and the State Fair races on the mile track at Yakima.

REMOVING MOLES AND BIRTH-MARKS

Birthmarks are due to an overgrowth of the blood-vessels at one spot in the skin. There are two kinds, the raised and the flat. The raised is the easiest to handle. The "strawberry mark" as it is called, is a reddish raised spot, appearing often on the forehead or between the eyes of a new baby. There are several treatments for this, of which the best is radium. It should be removed soon after the appearance, as it leaves practically no scar while the child is still young. Any adult, however, with a strawberry mark which was not removed in infancy may safely undergo the same treatment with success.
