Born at Peter's Road, where he spent his early boyhood days, he with his parents removed to Peter's Road where the land was largely held in the embrace of the primeval forest. Here he engaged in farming near the parental home, taking as his partner in life Miss Mercy C. Bears of this place. In order to further the home interests he spent some years in the West, on the construction of the C. P. R., returning home at its completion in the year 1885. He succeeded in building up and maintaining a comfortable and beautiful home, which remains a credit to his untiring perseverance. During all his life Mr. MacDonald was a close student of world-wide events, and kept in close touch with the history and movements of the nations in general. During the Great War he could locate the movements of the different armies on that far flung battle line with a precision that was remarkable. His love of British institutions was paramount, and he had strong faith in the ultimate success of her enterprise. As a citizen, Mr. MacDonald was held in the highest esteem, by his acquaintances and neighbours, all of whom knew his strictly honest nature, his unflinching adherence to truth, sobriety and wisdom. But above all he had a high reverence for sacred things, and was faithful in attendance to church services. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church at Peter's Road, and during his illness he cast himself entirely on the finished work of Christ his Saviour, and was not afraid to descend into the Valley because he was borne in the "Everlasting Arms." The funeral services held in the Presbyterian Church at Peter's Road were conducted by Rev. A. Brown, M. A., who spoke most impressively yet cheering from the 115th psalm.
