The Post Office was moved to the new building on Queen Street yesterday morning and in the afternoon everything was in good running order. The temporary office is as comfortable as it can be with limited space.

The following schooners loaded by McLean & Cameron sailed from Crapaud on Friday, viz: Iona with 3,500 bus oats, 2000 bus potatoes, and 300 bus turnips for Sydney. Also schr. Mina Belle for Halifax with 1800 bus potatoes, 250 bus turnips.

This marriage is announced to take place in St. Paul's Church, Charlottetown, on Wednesday, Dec. 2nd, of Miss Mamie K. Lounsbury, and niece of John J. Davies of this city to Harry Williams, eldest son of Thomas Williams, accountant of the I. C. R. Moncton.

Rev. G. E. Forbes who is soon to go to Korea as a missionary arrived in the City by the Princess last evening and will address a meeting under the auspices of the W. F. M. S. of Zion Church his evening at 8 o'clock. The public are invited to attend this meeting.

The schooner Australis sailed for Halifax from Crapaud on Friday last with 3,500 bus potatoes, and on Saturday schr. Nellie Reid with 3000 bus potatoes and 3000 bus oats for same place. Also same day schooner Rialto for Pictou with 27.0 bus oats. Above three cargoes were loaded by Wright Bros.

The many friends of Miss Sadie McLeod daughter of Neil McLeod of St. Peter's Bay will be pleased to hear that she was able to return to her home yesterday after undergoing an operation at the P.E. Island Hospital. Miss McLeod speaks in glowing terms of the many kindnesses extended to her by the different nurses.
