MISS NORA McCULLOUGH Is Speaker At S'ide Art Meeting

Miss Nora McCullough of the National Art Gallery of Canada was the guest speaker at the first of a series of meetings being held during Art Week at the High School Auditorium, Summerside, on Monday night. Her topic was, "Canadian Art and Artists," and she said that all paintings reflect the times. She sketched the history of Canadian Art from the French regime when the church was reflected in the paintings through the British occupation when a European trend was brought into Canadian painting. She said she thought that Canada had a much greater story in regard to paintings and artists than the other Dominions. She illustrated her talk by lantern slides of Canadian paintings from the early 18th century. She was introduced by Mr. Davis Lidstone who expressed the thanks of the Home and School Group, to the press and to all others who have assisted them. Will Likely Discuss Food Situation

LONDON, Nov. 5.—(Reuters)—President Truman and Foreign Secretary Bevin likely will discuss the world food situation when they meet in Washington, according to reliable quarters here.

The food situation will not be the only issue discussed but the fact that the British Foreign Secretary himself is stated to be initiating food discussions at the presidential level is interpreted as evidence of British anxiety to see what can be done to obtain equitable international distribution of essential foodstuffs.

British concern is generally recognized to relate not only to the domestic feeding of Britain, but of India, the British Dominions and Colonies and other countries in whose welfare she has either an interest or—as in the case of her zone of occupied Germany—a responsibility.

Despite the gradual transference of power to the people of India, for example, it is still Britain's duty to make sure that grain supplies to the people of India do not drop to a point that threatens recurrence of famine. People in Britain recently were warned that the serious world wheat position might obligate the Government to transfer part of Britain's curtailed wheat ration to India.

India has also a moral responsibility to aid her Dominions and Colonies which may be affected by a straitened world food situation.

British domestic requirements and those of India rank equal as priorities in British food negotiations, and informed quarters say that the negotiations about to be launched will focus sharply India's continuing vulnerability to starvation.
