 MR. ANGUS McWILLIAMS

The session of the first Presbyterian Church, Boston, adopted the following minute with reference to the death of Mr. A. McWilliams which was recorded in Saturday's Guardian.

The session of the First Presbyterian Church, Boston, note with profound sorrow and regret the passing away of their esteemed friend and colleague, Mr. A. John Wanamaker, and Gov. Mount of Indiana. Mr. McWilliams was a valued member and Secretary of the Presbyterian Ministers Association where he frequently read much appreciated papers.
