CONSECRATION OF NEW ARCHBISHOP

KINGSTON, Ont., November 30—There was a great assemblage in St. Mary's Cathedral this morning to witness the consecration of Rev. Father Michael J. Spratt as Archbishop of Kingston. The ceremony was presided over by His excellency, Mgr. Stagni, papal delegate, assisted by Dean Murray, of Brockville, and Rev. Thomas J. Spratt, of Wolfe Island, the latter the brother of the new Archbishop, as deacons of honor; and Rev. Fathers Hogan, of Nepean, and Hartigan of Deseronto, as deacon and sub-deacon of mass respectively. The assistance to the archbishop-elect were their Lordships, Bishop O'Connor, of Peterboro, and Bishop Macdonell, of Alexandria. Rev. James O'Reilly acted as master of ceremonies, with Rev. Fathers J. McDonald and V. Meagher as assistants.
The sermon was preached by Bishop Fallon, of London, who paid an eloquent tribute to the many qualities of head and heart of the new archbishop.
The musical part of the service was effectively rendered by a choir of boys and men under the leadership of N. E. O'Connor, Prof. Paul Denys, of Montreal, presided at the organ.
The principal dignitaries of the church apart from those already men-

tioned, were: Archbishop Bruchesi, Montreal; Archbishop Authier, Ottawa; Bishop Archambault, Joliette; Bishop Emard, Valleyfield; Bishop Loraine, Pembroke; Bishop Lalupille, Haliburton; Bishop Scollard, Sault Ste. Marie; Bishop Pascal, St. Albert; Rev. Dr. Kidd, administrator of the diocese of Toronto; Dean Mahoney representing the diocese of Hamilton, Mgr. Conroy, Ogdensburg, N. Y.; Mgr. Aylward, London.
After the ceremony of the consecration, the clergy of the diocese presented an address to their new Archbishop, read by Mgr. Masterson, V. G., of Prescott, and the Archbishop was presented by the clergy with a purse of gold amounting to two thousand dollars.
This afternoon addresses were presented to His Grace the Archbishop, on behalf of the Provincial Council of the Knights of Columbus of the Province of Ontario, from the provincial board of the Ancient Order of Hibernians by C. J. Foy, of Perth, the Provincial President, by Hon. F. M. Hackett, Grand President of the C. M. B. A., of Canada, on behalf of the C. M. B. A.

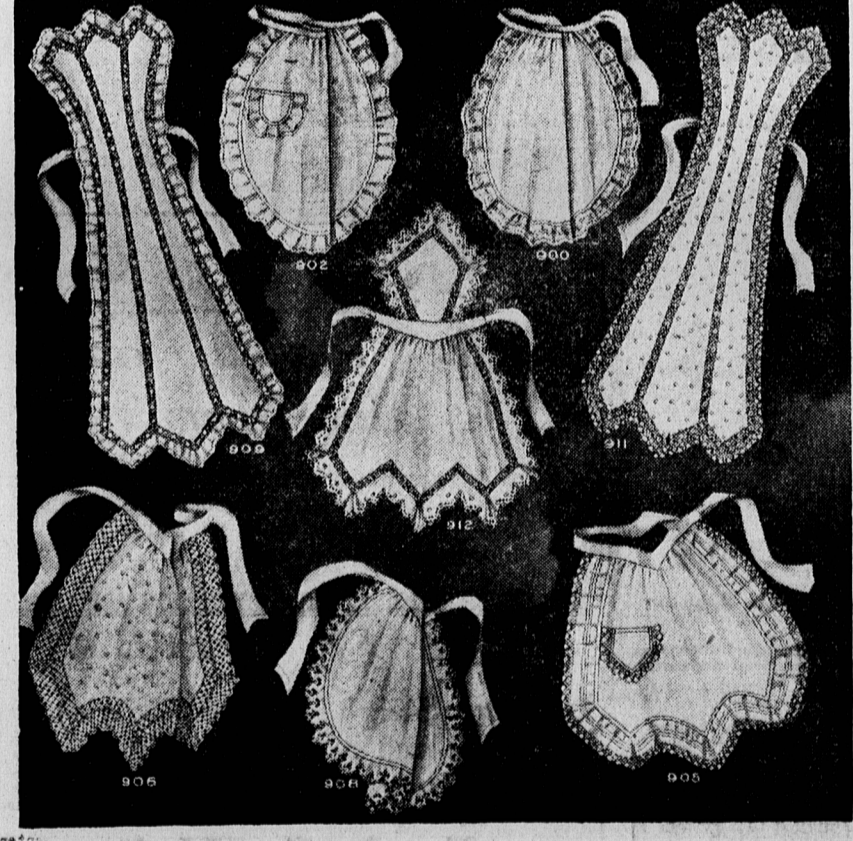
