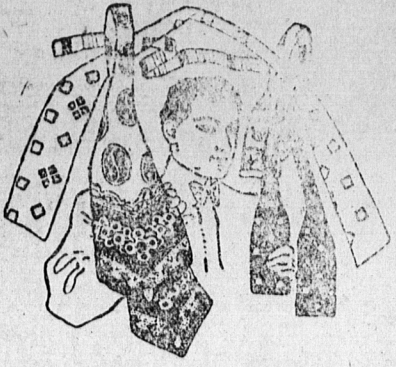

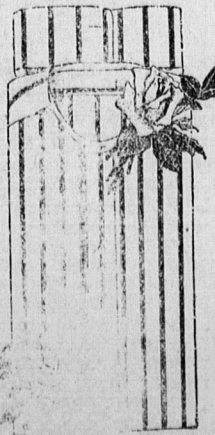

A good deal of produce was moving, with but slight changes in prices, and raised: potatoes (reds) 23; (blues) 25; oats (white) 51; (black) 52; turnips 11c; hay per ton \$16; pork per lb. 8 1/2c. Inside the city was a good supply of poultry, etc. Eggs sold at 24c a dozen; butter 24-25c per lb. gee e \$1 to \$1.30; ducks per pair 90 to \$1. Chickens were a little lower, ranging from 65c to 75c a pair. Wild geese sold at \$1 to \$1.25 each, and brant at \$1.20 a pair, straw per ton \$6.

Matheson, fishery inspector of this Province and were visiting Richmond Bay to enquire into the oyster fishery conditions existing there. They left last night for Charlottetown to attend a convention to discuss the lobster industry.

These passed away at Crapaud on Thursday October 3rd after a long illness Florence Leard, the beloved wife of Jesse Leard aged 24 years. The late Mrs. Leard was a daughter of the late Henry Williams, Inkerman and leaves 13 mourners, besides a sorrowing husband, one child, a mother, seven brothers and five sisters. The funeral took place on Oct. 4th to Westmoreland cemetery, and was largely attended. The Revs. Messrs. Tyner and Godfrey officiated.

The Gloucester Bay Gazette, which has been looking up the fisheries statistics of Canada very closely, finds that the Maritime Provinces practically supply the world with lobsters, there being in season 713 canneries in operation on our sea coast. Nova Scotia has 242 of such establishments, New Brunswick, 197; Prince Edward Island 199 and Quebec 82. Over 14,000 persons are employed in the industry, and the value of the output canned and alive, exceeds three and a half million dollars annually.
