PROTESTS WERE NOT ALLOWED

NEW YORK, December 5.—The board of review of the National Trotting Association concluded a four days' session yesterday with decisions in a number of small cases, which remained over from Thursday. Louis M. Siever, of Williamston, Vt., brought a case against the Pine Tree Stables, of Lewiston, Me., protesting the entries of El Galo and Brownette, in a race at the latter town, on the ground that they were from the same stable. The evidence showed that Brownette changed hands and was not of the same stables as El Galo, and the protest was not allowed. Among the persons who applied unsuccessfully for releases were A. H. Bragg, Fairfield, Me.; Frank H. Hayden, Lewiston, Me.; and W. McMullen, Fall River, Mass.

MONTREAL TO HAVE GREAT ICE PALACE

MONTREAL, December 5.—At a meeting last night it was decided to hold a winter carnival in Montreal, February 10th to 20th. It was determined to hold the carnival despite the opposition of railways and board of trade, who contended that the ice palace advertising hurts immigration. Merchants has outgrown such prejudices, and they have already subscribed \$10,000 for the celebration.

Ed. Shepperd, president of the arena, was made chairman of the committee to conduct the event, which is intended to be made a more elaborate affair than was held in Montreal eighteen years ago. It was also decided to have an ice palace.

PEACE REIGNS IN ST. PIERRE

ST. PIERRE, Miq., December 5.—The excitement caused by the recent disturbances in this colony over the question of parochial schools, has entirely subsided for the present at least. Governor Didot who arrived here from France on the cruiser Admiral Aube on Saturday last has experienced no unpleasantness. It is expected that the cruiser will remain here until the school question is finally settled and a supply of coal for her use is on its way here from North Sydney. The schools which the government attempted to close are still open. It is believed that the island will remain calm until the decision of the French government in the school matter has been received.

MRS. COMPEL'S BODY CREMATED AS REQUESTED

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—In accordance with her written request the body of Mrs. Eleanor Meron Cowper, the actress who committed suicide in the St. Regis Hotel was cremated at North Bergeon, N. J. The only friend present was the woman's counsel, Judge Royce, of Middletown.

CLASSIFICATION OF CIVIL SERVICE DIFFICULT TASK

OTTAWA, Dec. 5.—The problem of the classification of the civil service under the provision of the act passed by the government in the month of August is a difficult task. During the summer and autumn months the various deputy heads of the departments were engaged in an effort to classify the employees of whom they have charge. More recently, it is understood, the classifications were the subject of a good deal of consideration in council. As was to be expected, the classifications arrived at by the various deputies were not by any means uniform. One deputy would object to the putting of a clerk doing a particular kind of work in a higher class than another deputy would consider a clerk doing almost a similar class of work entitled to the result perhaps being a difference of from three to five hundred dollars in salary.

CASTRO CANNOT VISIT PARIS

PARIS, Dec. 5.—The French government is giving consideration to how President Castro, of Venezuela, shall be treated upon his arrival at Bordeaux. After the ignominious fashion in which the French Minister was expelled from Caracas, the government feels that it would be justified in refusing to allow the President of Venezuela to land here as Castro is reported to be ill. Humanitarian considerations prevent the government from taking such a course, but in no case will he be permitted to come to Paris.

MATRON PUNCHES EYE OF HEARTBREAKER

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Dec. 5.—Alleging that Arthur St. Fington, a handsome young man, had been instrumental in getting her husband to "go out at night" and leave her alone, Mrs. Mary Wilmer, a comely matron of South Georgia avenue, waited until the man came into her store and asked for Wilmer, and then punched him in the eye, according to the evidence in Magistrate De Mar's court, where the woman had been summoned to answer to an assault charge.

Mrs. Wilmer, backed by other women, declared that the man posed as a "heart breaker," and that various husbands had been lured out on evening expeditions which resulted in the man getting a black eye.

"This fellow simply hangs around until he gets my husband out, and then puts a regular iron" declared Mrs. Wilmer, who was later released by the court.

H. M. S. BRILLIANT COMING TO HALIFAX

ST. JOHN'S Nfld., December 5.—The British warship Brilliant, which has been stationed here for several weeks, sailed Thursday for the West Indies via Halifax. The situation in St. Pierre, Miquelon, is unchanged. The town is quiet and the clerical schools remain open. As yet Governor Didot has not announced the decision of the French government regarding the school question. The attempt to close the clerical schools last month led to the demonstrations before the Government House and a display of the American flag. One time it was thought that in the absence of French warships the Brilliant might be ordered to St. Pierre.
