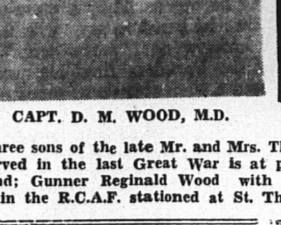

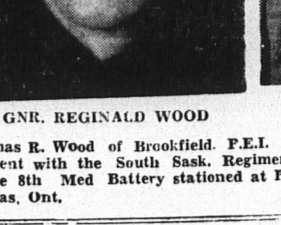

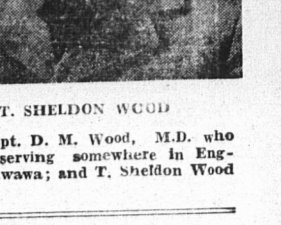

Horror of Air Raid Told to Fund

A terrible story of two women's experience in an air raid in England, which is being told to the Canadian Fund for Air Raid Victims. It is impossible to read this letter without wishing to do something to help this mother and daughter; yet there are thousands and thousands in similar need.

Women Have 'Nowhere to Go' After Terrible Experience

I am writing of my experience in a bomb air-raid in Southampton, Hants. There were just my mother and I in the house at the time of the raid. You see for a very long time my mother had been a sufferer of rheumatism and because of that, we could not go to the garden shelter in winter.
