Raoul Raymond, Southport, has sold the well-known trotting mare Calumet Bee 2.11 to William Warren, Clinton, P.E.I. He has also disposed of Addie McGraw 2.10 to John McGillivray, expert horseowner of Clyde River. Addie McGraw was one of the greatest trotters ever raced in the Maritimes. She was bred by H. C. Jewett, Fredericton, and made her appearance as a four-year-old, making a record of 2:14 3/4. As a five-year-old she won almost all her starts and set up a new track trotting record at New Annan of 2:11 3/4. She was then purchased by Raymond & McNeill and ridden very successfully under their colors. Retired to the brood mare ranks she has produced two beautiful offspring.

Alfred McNeill, son of Wellington McNeill Southport, has sold his high-class saddle horse Peavine Lad to H. J. Kelley, Manager of the Dominion Steel Company, Sydney, N.S., for a long price. Peavine Lad will be remembered by many who saw him exhibited at the Provincial Exhibition evening horse shows. It is doubtful if a better horse for saddle purposes can be found in the Maritimes.

E. LeRoi Willis, four score years and ten, and without question one of the finest men in the Maritimes Province, congratulates us on our review of harness racing in the Maritimes and states that he will be back with us at the Provincial Exhibition the coming summer. "No better Exhibition can be found anywhere," says Mr. Willis and he should know.

He was sold as a four-year-old to Mr. Willis, who drove him to victory at Lewiston and afterwards had his name changed to Special Blend.

Hedley T. Fulton writes us from Upper Stewiacke, N.S., that his colts are doing well in Harry Short's stable, Columbus, Ohio. Both are three year olds. The Tommie colt, Gallant Heart, is showing a lot of trot and Mr. Short has staked him quite heavily. Marvel, the Abbeville colt, is a picture and takes to his work like a champion. It would be surprising if he heads quite a number of summaries this season, although he will be in hot company. Mr. Fulton hopes to have some horses racing in the Maritimes either this season or next. 4 Teams Still Undeclared In Competition

Four rinks, the Bank of Nova Scotia, Imperials, Moguls and Big Four remained undeclared as play continued yesterday in the opening round of the Macdonald-Brier elimination curling competition to decide the city team that will enter the Island playoffs against rinks from Summerside and Moncton, the winner of which will travel to Winnipeg to take part in the Dominion Tankard. But with the exception of the Bank of Nova Scotia rink skipped by W. R. Adams who disposed of the J. A. Bentley skipped rink the other three had to come from behind to keep their record intact.

Rankine McLaine's Big Four had a mighty scare thrown into them in an afternoon match as L. B. MacMillan's Invincibles piled up an 11-7 lead in the first nine rinks; but here the defending champions faded with a big five on the tenth to take a one point lead and then won the remaining two ends one and two.

W. R. Jenkins' Imperials also forged to the front with a big four on the tenth end after trailing J. P. Crockett 7 to 5 up to this point, and they likewise won the final two ends.

A. Belcher's Moguls figured in the fourth exciting match of the day as going into the final end Dr. H. McIntyre's Wings rink made a sensational bid for victory. Wings were trailing 9-5 but had four stones counting as Skip Belcher sent his final stone down the ice; the skip of the winning team took out a stone to leave McIntyre with but one score counting the final count being 9-5 for the Moguls.

But the closest and most exciting match of the day was between W. R. Cruickshank's Bombers and A. W. Hyndman's Hawks. For eight ends the two rinks waged a real dog-fight. Bombers went into a 3-1 lead on the first two, Hawks got back on the third; Bombers chalked up a one on the fourth to lead 4-2 but the losers captured the next three ends to take the lead 5-4 with the winners knotting the count by capturing the eighth. Again the Hawks took a two point lead on the ninth and tenth ends with singles but the Bombers scored a sensational five on the 11th to take the lead 10-7 and yielded but one point on the final end to emerge the winners by a 10-8 score.

W. D. Brenton's Royals gained the win column as they curled to a 13-6 victory over W. W. Lord's Regals in the other match played. Royals started off with a four on the first end and were never headed afterwards although the Regals put on a rally to capture the last two ends of the match. Yesterday's schedule completed 12 matches of the 66 that will be curled in the opening round and play will be continued Monday in a competition that promises to get hotter and hotter.

DETROIT, Jan. 12-(CP)—Detroit Red Wings defeated Americans 4-2 tonight to leave the New York Yankees alone in the National Hockey League cellar. The win placed Detroit in sixth place, behind Montreal, Canadiens. The defeat was the fourth straight for the hapless Amerks. A crowd of approximately 2,500, one of the smallest ever to see a National League game in Detroit, was on hand. Heroes of the Detroit victory were Eddie Goodfellow, veteran defenceman who scored a pair of goals and Connie Brown, rookie forward who counted one goal and assisted in two more. Outplayed and outmanoeuvred, the Americans made few threatening gestures. A remarkable shot by Harvey Jackson gave the Americans their final goal, Jackson got the shot away late in the second period with a Red Wing player on his back. The Wings scored in the first five minutes of play and never trailed.

Fate Hands Maple Leafs A "Break"

Every once in a while, fate seems to hand the front office of Toronto Maple Leafs — a pretty healthy organization at any time — an extra little bouquet to help alone the gate receipts. Take tonight's National Hockey League game for instance, with the Leafs entertaining New York Rangers. There's a 'natural' if there ever was one, with the Rangers out to break an all-time N.H.L. record by going 19 games without a loss, and Toronto just as anxious to break the streak and put into a tie for first place at the same time. But while the game is a natural from the point of view of the front office, it comes at a bad time for the Toronto team itself. The Leafs were the leading team in the present wonder-team of the league with a lineup badly dented by injuries. The leaf board of strategy said last night that Gordie Drillon, the league's leading scorer, would still be on the sidelines nursing an injured foot. Play-making E.Y. Apps is out for some time yet, as is Nick Metz, and no team can lose three point-makers like those without feeling it plenty. At that, though, the Leafs are better able to stand the loss than most other teams in the circuit, because of the size of their roster.

The Toronto-Rangers game is the only one scheduled for tonight, but all the teams except Toronto will see action Sunday. The Rangers move on to Chicago to tackle the hot-and-cold Black Hawks. The Leafs' double victory over the week-end would put them well out in front in the standings. Boston Bruins, tied with Rangers for the leadership at present, will play hosts to Canadiens, who are still striving desperately to find their cure for the ills that have driven them down to fifth place in a disastrous losing streak. And as if the Canadiens didn't have enough trouble already, Manager Art Ross of the Bruins announced in Toronto last night that several hundred Japanese machine-gunned and drowned in northern Kwangtung Province.

DETROIT, Jan. 12-(AP)—The 11 players, with the Yanks landing five berths—same as last year—and Boston Red Sox three. University Team Display Reversal Of Form To Tie For 3rd Place In Standing

In another complete reversal of form that saw a team run the score into double figures for the first time since the league got underway, S.D.U. hockey squad last night drew up in a tie with the Army team for third place in the standing of the Commercial-Service league as they whipped the Soldiers 10-3 in a wide-open fast encounter. With Chris Gallant, rangy S.D.U. defenceman starting the scoring splurge with two goals in the first two minutes of play Saints got away on the right foot and Jack Coyle and Bert Steele from then on took up the torch in leading the University to their second victory. The mercury-footed Steele and swivel-hipped Coyle accounted for six more tallies with the former getting four of them as McInnis patrolling right wing on the Saints second line accounted for the other two markers.

It was an altogether different looking team that Coach Father Murphy sent out last night with Grant being sent up on the wing and McInnis making his debut but the shifts worked perfectly and after the Saints had taken their early lead they kept pressing their opponents all the way although the Army bolstered by the return to their lineup of the Roach brothers Jimmy and Vince on more than one occasion forced the Saints to their best defensive heights to retain their margin. 37 seconds after the opening whistle Gallant cradled the disc on his stick at his own line speeded down the right boards, swerved in to the front of the cage to slide a shot into the cage. Three minutes later he duplicated the performance only this time on the left side of the rink to chalk up goal number two for the Saints. Army were pressing back hard and Jimmy Roach just missed by inches as his drive whizzed past the unprotected corner. Steele sent the Saints into a 3-goal lead at 8:30 of the period on the third unassisted goal of the session tearing down the left boards to pick an open corner from 15 feet in front of Waters' citadel. Army weren't clicking in scoring position but finally broke into the lead when P. Roach from five feet out slammed a shot that appeared to hit the back of the net and bounce out; but whether it was in or not made little difference as McDonald Army defenceman slammed the water right back and the cage and this time there was little doubt of it. Wright's penalty left the Army shorthanded at the start of the second but Jimmy Roach on a break from a gang attack tested Connolly with a hard drive Steele lashed back into the picture again as he put on another solo effort outkating the entire Army team to go in close on the Army netminder who didn't have a chance. Both teams were missing wide-open nets as the game opened wide but with only a second remaining Coyle shot his first goal as he was on the scoring end of a play that Steele and Gallant drew assists on. Bucko Trainor, Army spearhead was still serving out a second period penalty as the teams got away for the third and final stanza. It took the Saints just sixteen sec-

onds to score when Coyle was sent into the clear on a pass from Steele and the former's blistering 10-footer again had Watts beaten all the way. Army fighting back missed two open nets in a row but finally clicked for a goal as Jimmy Hogan set up the scoring play for Pete Sinclair for the Army's second goal. Saints got that one back at 10:05 as McInnis snared a loose puck inside the line to go right to Watts' doorstep before letting fire into the draperies. 40 seconds later Jimmy Hogan got credit for the second Army goal as his pass across the mouth of the net deflected off an Army player's skate and into the cage, over their third goal. Saints however had the final say as Steele scored his final two goals. The first came on a pass from centremen Coyle and the other was unassisted as he raced away on a breakaway. McInnis got his second marker a minute and eighteen seconds before the final bell beating the Army's goalie with a shot from well out.
