ister has made it clear that no further licenses for the export of power will be granted.

WATER POWER Canada possesses only four and one-half per cent of the water power resources of the earth, yet she leads the world in horse power from water, in per capita consumption and holds the records for size of stations and equipment. Though the United States led in the amount of turbine horse power installed but sixty-seven per cent was fuel power, while in Canada eighty per cent was water power. The Queenston plant of the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario, now the largest in the world, will be surpassed by the Dnieper river development in Russia when completed. (To Be Continued)

WILL INVESTIGATE MORGAN'S STOCK TRANSACTIONS

(By William L. Beale) (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, June 6.—(A.P.)—Senate investigators today voted overwhelmingly to examine J. P. Morgan & Company partners about stock transactions affecting their taxable incomes, but for the present continued to study the Van Sweringen railroad domain with its Morgan financing links. The decision regarding income tax inquiries was made by the Banking Committee by an 11 to 6 vote after a hotly argued two hours behind locked doors while the Van Sweringen Brothers—O.P. and M.J.—waited to testify and J. P. Morgan joked with his aides in the warm hearing room. After listening to John W. Davis, Morgan Counsel, challenge the committee's authority to drag out into public income tax returns made secret by law, and their own counsel Ferdinand Pecora reply that his questions to young Thomas S. Lamont were within the scope of the inquiry, the Senators adopted this resolution: "It is the sense of this committee that it should inquire into the practices of buying and selling securities as such practices may affect the taxing powers of the Government; but inasmuch as the legal right of the Committee to proceed along this line of inquiry is challenged, the Committee should proceed immediately with railroad

public utility and all other phases of the investigation and the subcommittee charged with the investigation be directed to report a resolution enlarging the powers of the committee as soon as possible in such manner as may be deemed necessary to enable it to inquire into the above practices."
