LABOR DAY FITTINGLY CELEBRATED

Labor Day was fittingly celebrated Monday in the city, by the Laborers Protective Union and the Truckmen's Union.

In the morning at ten o'clock, they paraded the principal streets of the city headed by the Legion Band and the parade was the best ever turned out by the above unions.

Besides the Legion Band there was also the Glace Bay Band and the Highland Pipe Band.

The music played by the three bands was splendid indeed and added much to the success of the big parade.

Mr. Robert Wakelin was the chief Marshall of the Laborers Union and Mr. Michael Hennessey was the chief marshal of the Truckmen's Union.

The C. N. R. firemen also took part in the parade and presented a fine appearance.

The chemical engine of the City Fire Department was also in the parade.

The truckmen's horses were all groomed for the occasion, and they looked spick and span. There were a couple of nice floats which added much to the parade.

THE SPORTS

In the afternoon at 1:30 athletic sports took place at the Exhibition Grounds, and there were about two thousand people present, and they certainly were not disappointed, and well repaid for their money.

There was over four hours of real fun and enjoyment, which would be hard to beat by any city.

The various athletic events were all exciting and hotly contested.

Dick Diamond won the beautiful trophy for the best all round athlete. This trophy was donated by Mr. Fred Cludet. It was a splendid idea on the part of Fred to give this trophy as it made the competition keener on the part of the contestants.

There were three horse racing events for truckmen and these proved of great interest and some exciting finishes took place.

The boxing bouts took the spectators by storm and had the large crowd in roars of laughter while these events were on.

The first bout was a six rounder between "Young" Fred McIsaac and S. Ryan, and from the gang McIsaac landed body punches on his opponent in an endeavor to put him away, but Fred did not deliver his famous "spiral" punch till the sixth round, when Ryan took the count and referee Willie Scantlebury held McIsaac's hand up as the winner amid tremendous applause.

The other bout was between champion Joe O'Brien and Toto. O'Brien wore his championship belt during the bout, and it looked as though he was going to lose it in the first round, when his opponent put over a couple of "love taps" on Joe's chin, but Joe worked his famous "liver" punch on Toto in the third round and he went down for the count, and O'Brien still retained the championship. The crowd from the stands yelled themselves hoarse when Joe was declared the winner.

Two of the most exciting and hardest contested events of the day was the two tug-of-war matches, and great interest was manifested in these events.

The first one was between the L. P. U. and Truckmen, the truckmen winning the final pull.

The second tug-of-war was between the C. N. R. team and a local team. This was a strenuous contest. The C. N. R. won the first pull, the local team the second pull, and in the final pull the C. N. R. won out. The coaches of both teams worked hard to bring victory to their team, and it was without a doubt one of the best tug-of-war contests seen in many years.

The men's dancing contest was another good feature of the day's proceedings and each performer received a big handout from the spectators when he finished his dance.

A very thoughtful and praiseworthy act on the part of the Union men was in inviting the children of St. Vincent's and Protestant Orphanages to see the sports. They had a place reserved in front of the grandstand and the children were treated to ice cream and candy.

The whole day's proceedings was a credit to the Union men. Everything went along in a first class manner, and it is hoped that next year the Union men will put on such another day's splendid sport.
