SOME time ago a physical test of the herd of milk cows of W. A. Mutch, Hope-ton was made but in order to meet every wish of the Board of Health. Mr. Mutch several days ago had the tuberculin test applied by Dr. McMillan V. S. The result was very satisfactory, absolutely no trace of tuberculosis being shown. This will be gratifying to Mr. Mutch's many patrons.

At the annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Exhibition commission in Halifax on Tuesday night the president said that the deficit this year was \$10,032.56, and in view of the fact that there has been \$5000 of a falling off in the receipts, he was surprised that the showing was so good. The expenditure had been \$34,704.51 and receipts \$23,771.95. The deficit last year was \$2230, the expenditure this year \$34,704.51 as against \$34,381.30 last year. The Dominion Exposition opens on Sept. 24th and closes October 7th.

MANY Dundas farmers are busy hauling farm produce to Neil McKay, who is loading a large vessel for Geo. C. Cook, Halifax. The vessel is rather large for the port and will have to finish loading at Poplar Point, as she carries 6000 bushel potatoes besides a quantity of turnips, oats and hay.—Mr. McKay is paying good prices for pork and shipping to Halifax by Inverness from Bridgetown.—Rev. Mr. McPhee is holding revival meetings in Baptist Church.—Rev. Mr. McLeod expects to preach in Strathalbyn at an early date.

A CHARMING VOCALIST.—Last evening the members of the First Methodist Church Choir were given an informal recital by Miss Lena Murray. This talented vocalist has a rich contralto voice. To some years of local training she has added a year in Toronto under one of the best vocal teachers there. In enunciation she leaves little to be desired, she sings with artistic perception of both words and music. Last Sunday evening in the big church she sang two solos. The huge building was full. The singer had an audience worthy of her best effort and a magnificent interpretation she gave of "The Publican" and "Hark! Hark! my soul!" Few of the guests were up at this early hour and when aroused the building was filled with smouldering smoke which gave the impression that the fire was worse than it was. The smoke and the news that the main staircase was dangerous caused great alarm. Panic was threatened and guests ran everywhere looking for a way out. Many escaped in their night clothes through upper windows and down ladders. Some who were rescued in this way were ladies. Fortunately nobody was hurt. It was two hours before the fire was out, but little damage was done except by smoke and water. The loss is covered by insurance.

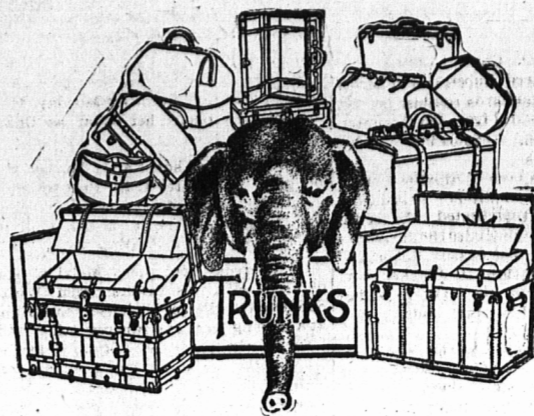

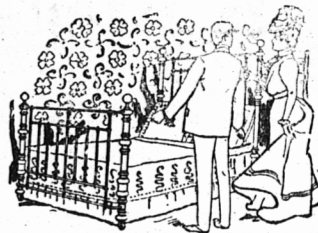
