## THE MENACE OF GAMBLING

One of the most challenging utterances against gambling in recent years has come from the Honorable Leslie E. Blackwell, K.C., Attorney-General of the Province of Ontario. In his address to Church organizations and Service Clubs, Mr. Blackwell made a moral approach to this problem and declared that to the extent that these groups violated the regulations of the Criminal Code governing lotteries, bingoes, etc., they were making the administration of the law intractable. Moreover, he warned that such gambling would, "something is not done by the Dominion and Provinces and in the hands of racketeers." The vicious tendency of gambling has never been questioned and wherever the god of Chance is worshipped it becomes an octopus, Lord Beaconsfield spoke of it as "a vast engine of national demoralization." Every civilized country in the world has subjected its citizens to the law and legislative constraints. Great Britain has been tightening her laws against its vice since the earliest enactment of 1542.

The chief administrator of law reproaches the citizen who reminds that laws are not self-executing but require the conscientious support of the law-abiding citizen. He is not to be together with the law enforcement officers, if they are to become effective for the wellbeing of society. He declared that anyone who purchases a lottery ticket is guilty of an offence against the law and liable to a fine; and that the promoters of an such scheme are liable to the same penalty, imprisonment and a fine not exceeding two thousand dollars. His contention was that the law is not self-executing and that the citizen who winks at such malpractices can consider itself innocent of interfering with the laws of the Province. It must be confessed that an increasing number of people have turned to the lottery for a quick way to get rich. Some people on a lucky draw for an automobile or a bungalow as a trifling incident in the passage of time, and for valuable prizes as an innocuous pastime. We have paid court to the men who run the lottery and praised the promoters of these schemes, when we ought to have understood it as robbery by consent and illegal racketeering preying upon the cupidity of the public. To be associated in any way with these gambling schemes is to be aligned with law-breakers, and to condone their practices is to be a part of the good government and destructive of public morals.

Dr. Michael M. Miller, the psychiatrist of St. Elizabeth Mental Hospital, claims that "drunkards are made not born." Dr. Miller which is to be used, lest it be misused. He is not to be used under medical direction. Dr. Miller's statement that "drunkards are made not born" is a warning to our workers in the temperance cause to still further efforts to keep the dangers of the use of alcoholic drinks in any form before our young people.

A mother once happened on her daughter's diary, and was saddened to find these words: "Since coming to college I have drunk more and more of the things that I have been always taught are wrong."

Influence is indeed potent, and there is too much loose talk before children about drinking, by parents who themselves would never think of drinking. They are not any danger of becoming drunkards, so think they can joke about it, but what of the little ones who have been taught to believe that Mother and Daddy are always right.

We certainly agree with Viola Whitney Pratt, editor of World magazine, that "drunkards are made not born." It is a terrifying thought that every idea expressed in the presence of

## LIQUOR MENACES WORLD PEACE

As beverage alcohol is notoriously the destroyer of peace in the home, and in the community, so also its tendency is to shatter it in all attempts to establish and maintain Peace among the nations. From the time when man first made fermented liquors down to the present, alcohol has broken up family life, degraded and blotted out whole communities, overturned kingdoms and empires and sown discord between nation and nation. The aim of Alexander the Great, a consummate leader of men and a consummate statesman, was to set up a Greek Empire in the East, failed because of his own addiction to heavy wine-drinking, which, added to his hard campaigning, brought about his death at the early age of 33. In spite of his genius he became a slave to his debauchery, and his great Empire fell to pieces within a few years of his untimely end.

In our own days the noble attempt made by the United States of America between 1919 and 1933 to shake herself free from liquor domination, was foiled by the concerted movement of international Alcohol Capital against Prohibition, and treaties made by America in 1924 with eleven countries to prevent the smuggling of liquor, showed how near to War she was brought by the importation of the Liquor Interests in other countries to violate her laws by interfering in her internal affairs.

The action of France and Spain in forcing Norway and Iceland, in spite of their opposition of Prohibition, to admit the entry of French and Spanish wines and spirits caused bitter resentment in the Northern countries. The unexpected collapse of France in June, 1940, was the result of the sapping of her national morale by the inordinate consumption of alcohol. The French people were fostered by successive French Governments. Hence distantly and disaster.

## Eric News Letter

DUBLIN, Feb 5 —(CP)—Loyal Irishmen now may utterbug, rhumba, waltz or fox-trot without incurring the wrath of the Gaelic League.

Prime Minister De Valera, who doesn't dance and isn't likely to start cutting a rug at his age, was the pioneer. He bravely defied the orthodox, particularly over the ball in Dublin for the benefit of the Army Benevolent Fund. Instead of the traditional Gaelic dances, the 4,000 guests "went modern."

Members of the League weren't even supposed to watch "foreign" dancing and old stalwarts held long discussions on the Prime Minister's defection. But at length they forgave him, and opened ballroom doors to swing-hungry followers.

During the war Irishmen used to ask: "who are we neutral for?" one in every seven men in Eire's army of 50,000 answered the question in forthright manner by crossing into Northern Ireland to join the British armed forces.

Defence Ministers Oscar Trainor told the Dail that of 7,000 deserters during the war, 4,000 were absent for more than 180 days and were to be punished by a special emergency powers order for joining the enemy.

The deserters will be forbidden employment in any state-sponsored scheme and denied unemployment money and army pension. The regulation is in effect for seven years.

Irishmen like a good fight, and many at home are grumbling over the order, particularly over the tag "deserter" placed on those who went voluntarily into danger.

FIVE INDIANS 336 FOR TWO SPOUSES  
WASHINGTON, Feb 8 —(CP)—The Navajo Indians have abandoned plural marriage, an old tribal custom.

Not only did they take the action without any urging from the Great White Father, but they had a hard time convincing him they really meant it. Under new tribal rules the penalty for taking more than one wife is a fine of \$30. However, Navajos with more than one wife may keep them all without penalty.

Officials of the Indian Office said the ban has had no effect several months but had not attracted attention.

To begin with, glame looks every bit as glamorous as its name implies. Crystal-like in color, it appears to be as delicate as sea-foam (but it isn't) and its transparency reflects light in a way to make it sparkle like a many-faceted jewel. Its use thus far has been chiefly for theatre curtains, where the play of many colored lights has full opportunity to dramatize its luminosity. A hand-some glame curtain may be seen on the stage in Radio City Music Hall in New York.

But glame has also been used experimentally for curtains and draperies in homes, and has passed use tests with such success that its manufacture is being developed to make glame curtains especially designed for homes. In one office where glame was used for glass curtains, it was discovered that while letting in light and air, the fabric filtered out so fast it did not come through into the room. Even though permeable enough to admit air, at the same time it warded off drafts.

## BANISH STRAIN FEAR BY PLASTIC FABRICS

LONDON, Feb. 8.—(CP)—If the board of trade and other government departments listen to pleadings of British fashion designers, to use some of the materials developed by scientists during the war, women should soon have some fun with their new clothes.

There is one fabric, a satin material which technicians call "photoluminescent." It glows in the dark with the same ghostly glow as a luminous watch face. It was employed to cover the landing paddies used at night on aircraft carriers.

The fabrics made of plastics for use in equatorial war zones will give designers enormous scope. Material used by Britain's Royal Air Force for rustproof insect screening, should be popular for office suits, for ink, grease or stains can be removed without bleaching with a damp cloth.
