

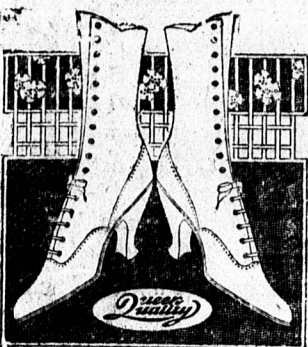

MONROE DOCTRINE UPHELD AS BULWARK AGAINST ABSOLUTISM

PARIS, April 12.—(By the Associated Press)—While the text of the Monroe Doctrine amendment adopted by the League of Nations commission at its session last night is withheld, its main features are substantially along the following lines: "Article X—Nothing in this covenant shall be construed as invalidating any agreement, such as the Monroe Doctrine, for the maintenance of peace."

Discussion of the Monroe Doctrine amendment at the League of Nations commission last night is described by those present as of a dramatic character, concluding by a speech by President Wilson deprecating the opposition which has been expressed and upholding the doctrine as one of the great bulwarks against absolutism. The debate came late in the session, after other subjects had been passed upon.

British Attitude Turned Scale

The British attitude had been in doubt until the last, but Lord Robert Cecil turned the scales by announcing that he saw no objection in the amendment in the term presented by the president. M. Larnaud, of the French delegation followed Lord Robert with objections to inserting the Monroe Doctrine.

The president paid the closest attention to the opposition to the amendment and jotted note for a reply. In his speech the president spoke with great earnestness and with some evidence of feeling.

The president declared that the Monroe doctrine was enunciated to combat the Holy Alliance and to hold the threat of absolutism which threatened Europe and seeking to spread its absolute power to the west.

ern hemisphere. It served its purpose in keeping this absolute power from the western world.

One of its great purposes, he said, was to maintain territorial and political integrity and having served its great purpose in the western world, it was now being brought to the lands which had felt the hand of absolutism and militarism. It was a source of surprise and discouragement, the president said to hear opposition expressed to such a doctrine and such a purpose.

The president's speech closed the discussion. There was no vote and when there were no further remarks, the chairman of the meeting said the amendment would be considered adopted. The commission then took up the next article of the covenant.

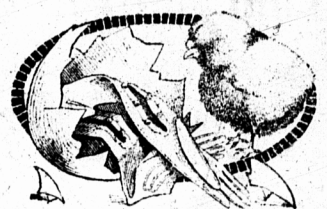
