

DESPITE THE WAR CANADA'S REVENUE IS ABOUT NORMAL

Liberals Make Frantic Efforts to Belittle the War Taxes.

OTTAWA, June 12.—A frantic effort is being made by the Laurier newspapers to show that the methods adopted by the Government for increasing the revenue are not increasing it. Just why these newspapers should desire to prove that things are not going as well as they ought, is not easily understandable except from one standpoint. That standpoint is the one of the Conservative, the man who is so much a partisan that the national success is nothing compared with the party success of himself and his friends. To this man party profit comes first, and so far gone is he with this disease that any prospect of bringing about a measure of failure in national affairs during the regime of a Conservative Government comforts him, cheers him up, makes him believe that his party is going ahead a little. Of course there isn't any such thing as genuine patriotism in this man's little soul; he has no sense of national duty, or he has, does not respond to it. He is, in fact, a true follower of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He strives to create national difficulties for his own party's benefit, at a time when every real Canadian should have no other desire and no other aim than to put his heart into the effort which men around him are making to advance the position of the Dominion to the end that the war may be successful.

delivered on February 11. The tariff increases of seven and a half per cent. general and five per cent. preferential became immediately operative. The improvement was immediate and marked. The February receipts were \$6,805,000. In March they increased to \$7,066,000; and in April they amounted to a slightly smaller total \$6,276,000.

Now Almost Normal
 It will be seen that the turn was made when the budget was delivered. The revenues since then have been practically equal to the revenues for the corresponding months of last year, months in which there was no war. It does not suit the Laurier newspapers to give their readers the truth about the country's finances, any more than it has suited them for months to give these same readers the truth in regard to the Liberal policy and record in connection with the war. These newspapers are faithful only to their own deficits, drawing their inspiration from a group of Liberal politicians whose conduct has been and still is a disgrace to Canada and a menace to the Empire.

Looking for Plunder

The action of the Liberal leaders and if their press is like that of the great horde of camp followers who in days to come used to overrun the battlefields of Europe in the wake of the fighters, despoiling and plundering. Liberal newspapers in carrying on this sort of thing do not, of course, care to what depths they stoop. They seek to warp the judgment of their readers by systematically misrepresenting to them conditions and developments in public affairs. It is not a high tribute to the intelligence of these readers, but it sometimes succeeds by sheer repetition. It is designed also to mislead those readers who are too busy, perhaps too indifferent, to study the facts for themselves.

A Simple Trick

The trick adopted with regard to the revenues is a simple one. The revenues from customs, which is the bulk of the national income, is taken by the month and compared with other war month returns. Now the customs revenue for April was less than that for March, being a light month, and that fact is advertised as proof that the tariff increase retorted to by the Government and sanctioned by Parliament, has not been successful. The true comparison should be made as between the monthly returns in the war period and the returns for corresponding months in the ante-bellum period. Such a comparison shows that the tariff changes have restored the revenue to approximately its old basis. They have, in fact, succeeded in the work for which they were intended, and their success will be more marked as the year goes on.

The War Months

It will be remembered that in the first months of the war the customs revenue fell sharply, and that declines were registered month after month. Some effort was made by Liberal critics in Parliament to show that these declines were not due to the war, an effort which was so fantastically absurd as to have receded on the heads of those who made it. The first war months were fall and winter months which under normal conditions of trade contributed very largely to the revenue. They should have and but for the war would have given returns running as high as nine millions a month. In August, the first war month, the receipts amounted to \$8,245,000, in round figures. They fell in the month of September to \$5,644,000, in October to \$5,331,000, in November to \$4,895,000, and in December to \$4,706,000; in January a very slight improvement took place, the customs revenue being \$4,757,000. How To Use Fertilizers

While the soil may contain certain qualities of fertilizer naturally, in most cases it will not pay to give serious attention to this source of fertilization. Farm yard manure and similar refuse substance especially, should always be used with hood crops, in which case it is plowed under otherwise it is best used as a top dressing. When plowed under farm manure (or any other) can plow unless the crop to be grown requires the entire growing season as, for example, Indian Corn. The fertilizer in such manures becomes available very slowly.
