Dorothy Dix Believes Good Home Produces Good Child

Mothers of Today Bear Heavy Burden of Responsibility for Their Children's Morals, Cries Dorothy Dix—The Home Which is Nothing But Four Empty Walls Cannot Produce Fine Men and Women

A young boy who committed suicide the other day left a note addressed to his sister "because she was the only one who was ever at home." That is not only one of the most pathetic heart cries I have ever heard, it is one of the most scathing arraignment of modern social conditions that has ever been made.

Nobody home! The house dark and lonesome when one rushed back from school or in from play. Nothing to eat except some cold stuff in the icebox, or perhaps on the dining table a few cookies weighting down a note saying "get yourself something at the delicatessen store at the corner."

Lonesome they for children to be left to spend their evenings by themselves, or with only a dull servant for company. They are not old enough to care much about reading. They are not fluent conversationalists.

It is a common thing to hear it said that the home has become out-moded; that it has become a place where people only go to change from day into evening clothes; that it has become a sort of springboard from which a family leaps off in different directions, and that the father and mother and children meet so seldom that they scarcely recognize each other at sight, and never get well enough acquainted to know one another's minds and souls.

This is only too sadly true, but the trouble is that when we throw the home and family life into the discard we have nothing to put in their place. Nobody ever yet has been ingenious enough to invent a satisfactory substitute for a home that is a place of love and peace and cheer and comfort, nor for the softness of a mother's breast, nor for the haven of a mother's arms.

That is something that has come down to us in our blood from the time the first hairy cave-man built a shack to shelter her young from the elements and cuddled her babe in the hollow of her shoulder. We all want home and mother, and we all want to be able to find mother in the home as surely as a saint in her niche. It is part of our surety in life.

There is nothing over which parents make so much moan as over the way their children wander around. "It is just terrible," they say, "the way young people go about. Never willing to stay at home. Always on the go. Coming home all hours of the morning from 'heaven knows where. Scandalous!' But the parents forget that if their children are little more than social tramps, they set the example. They blazed the way. They taught them to find their friends in gangs, their confidantes in strangers, their pleasure in the bright lights. They left it to the street to educate them, to fix their morals and form their manners.

It is one thing for children to come home from school of an afternoon to a mother who is always on her job, and who knows why if they are late; a mother who has always something good to eat waiting for a hungry boy and girl; a mother who knows how they spend their afternoons, and with whom they play, and who gathers them in of an evening as a hen does her brood under her wings, and who spends her evenings with them helping them with their studies, encouraging their ambitions, thrashing out with them the problems of their little lives.

And it is another thing for children to know that when they get home mother will be gone about her own diversions, that the door may even be locked and they will not have shelter unless they go to some other child's house, or hang around a fire-engine house or a corner grocery. Or that their afternoon's amusement will be taking a tiresome walk with a tiresome nursery governess who will hear their lessons and give them a nursery supper and put them to bed, and that their only glimpse of mother will be when she comes in to say good night to them and show them her new party frock as she is stepping out.

Which mother's children have the best chance to grow into fine men and women and make a success of life is obvious. Admittedly to have to be perpetually on duty calls for endless self-sacrifice. It is a high price to pay for motherhood, but unless a woman is willing to pay it she has no right to have children.
