AIR SQUADRON WILL ALIGHT AT SHEDIAC BAY

Italian Air Fleet En Route To Chicago—Will Receive Official Canadian Welcome At Shediac.

Shediac Bay, where the Italian Air Squadron, en route to Chicago, will alight and receive the Official Welcome from the Dominion of Canada is located on the East side of the Province of New Brunswick on Northumberland Strait. It is a beautiful landlocked bay of about 80 square miles area. The land surrounding the bay is low, not being over seventy-five feet above high water a mile or more from the shore. There are no strong currents and the average rise and fall of tide is between three and four feet. An unusual feature is the fact that as a rule there is only one high and one low tide in each twenty-four hours. The Bay is usually clear of ice by the end of April and is not frozen over until about Christmas. There are two wharves on the South side of the bay, that at Point du Chene having accommodation for craft drawing up to fifteen feet at low tide while at the Town of Shediac there is a fine wharf 1200 feet long with 8 feet of water at low tide. Both wharves are electrically lighted and railway, telephone and telegraph facilities are available at or near each wharf.

Possibly the greatest inducement for air craft to use Shediac Bay is the Italian Air Force as well as a fact contributed to a large extent in the selection of Shediac Bay by the Italian Air Force as well as a base for the past three years for planes of the Royal Canadian Air Force. Another feature of importance is the fact that the locality is particularly suited for the transmission and reception of wireless messages. This is borne out by the fact that a small portable station erected by the Italian Air Force is in daily communication with Rome. Shediac Bay is equipped with moorings for 25 of the largest flying boats as well as with smaller moorings for small pontoon planes. The bay is of sufficient size that flying boats of the largest size can alight and depart at any stage of tide and with the wind in any direction, in fact experts have declared that Shediac is destined to become the chief North American terminal for Trans-Atlantic air travel. In the present case the itinerary of the Italian Squadron on the Westward voyage is Italy, Holland, Ireland, Iceland, Labrador, Shediac, Montreal, Chicago. The re-

turn is by the southern route and is Chicago, New York, Shediac, Harbor Grace, Spain, Italy. Thus it will be seen that Shediac is the only stop in common to both routes.

The visiting airmen will be officially welcomed to Canada by the representatives of the Dominion Government, the Province of New Brunswick, and the town of Shediac.

The Canadian Cruiser "Saguenay" which will be in port and her officers and men will form a guard of honor for the distinguished visitors who will be headed by General Italo Balbo, the Italian Minister of Air.

Due to unusual ice conditions at Cartwright, Labrador, the date of arrival is uncertain but it will likely be in the third week of June, on the afternoon of the second day after their arrival in Labrador. The exact time will be announced by the press as early as possible.

The piloting of the harbour and air will be done by R. C. M. P. Patrol boats assisted by planes of the Royal Canadian Air Force.

By order of the Minister of National Defence planes will not be allowed to fly over or near Shediac Bay during the arrival or departure of the Italian Fleet.

H. E. General Italo Balbo

General Italo Balbo is one of the most popular champions of Fascism and one of the most characteristic figures of the Fascist Revolution.

As leader of the Fascist Party in the region of Ferrara, Commander of the Active Squadron of the Po Valley, "Quadrivir" of the March on Rome, Commander General of the Militia, Assistant Secretary for National Economy, Assistant Secretary and then Secretary for Aeronautics, his life is entwined with that of Fascism.

He is 37 years of age, born in Ferrara on June 5, 1896.

At the outbreak of the European War, he was among the first to advocate Italy's intervention. He instantly enrolled as a volunteer in the Alpine Corps. A very intrepid officer of the Alpine Corps, he was decorated with three medals for bravery. After the Armistice, he founded and directed the paper "L'Alpino". He obtained a Doctor's Degree in Social Science at Florence, and returning to Ferrara, he entered heart and soul into the Fascist cause, immediately becoming one of its most active leaders.

When the Fascist militia was organized, Italo Balbo was made one of the Commanders General. As a member of the "Quadrivirate" of the March on Rome, he was one of the most active leaders in those memorable revolutionary days. After the March on Rome, "Il Duce" appointed him Commander General of the Militia. Shortly after, he founded in Ferrara the paper "Il Corriere Padano". In October, 1925, Mussolini called him to the Government he was first appointed Assistant Secretary for National Economy, and then, in October, 1926, he was entrusted with the Assistant Secretaryship of Aeronautics. In a few months, he received his pilot's license and became one of the most expert pilots.

Italo Balbo has impressed upon Italian Aeronautics his enthusiasm and has so inspired it with his activity, that in the years of his Assistant Secretaryship, Italian aviation has reached heretofore unparalleled heights, conquering the highest world records.

In August, 1928, he was appointed General in the Air Service.

In September, 1929, he was raised to the post of Secretary of Aeronautics.

General Balbo has initiated a new method in Italian mass flights out of Italy, and in fact, he himself has conducted various memorable cruises with a great number of planes in the Western and Eastern Mediterranean, across Europe from Rome to London and Berlin, and then from Italy to Rio de Janeiro (South America).

The first cruise took place in 1928 across the Western Mediterranean with an Air Brigade of 61 scouting seaplanes; the second was performed in 1929 across the Eastern Mediterranean and the Black Sea as far as Odessa with a fleet of 35 large, two-motor, bombing seaplanes.

In 1931, at the head of a fleet of large, two-motor seaplanes, model S-55, he performed the flight from Rome to Rio de Janeiro, ac-

PRODUCE

MONTREAL, June 18—The upward trend displayed the previous week on the Montreal dairy and produce markets was continued during last week's trading. Prices of butter, eggs and cheese all being fractionally stronger.

Wholesale butter prices advanced 1/2 to 3/4 cents a pound for No. 1 ending the week at 19 cents a pound for extra or less. A substantial increase in receipts was noted. Offerings this week totaled 21,911 boxes, while the previous week 19,988 boxes were received. Last week butter exported from Montreal amounted to 43,460 boxes of Canadian butter, 96 boxes of Australian butter and 43 boxes of New Zealand butter, all going to the West Indies or Newfoundland.

Grades shipment of eggs in cartons or less gained a half to 1 1/2 cents a dozen. Prices ended the week at 18 cents for extras, 14 1/2 to 15 cents for firsts and 12 1/2 cents for seconds. Receipts were also heavier, with 16,340 cases being received last week as compared with 15,732 cases a week ago. Five hundred cases were exported from Montreal to Glasgow last week, this being a further shipment in connection with recent heavy orders. There were also eight cases shipped to the West Indies.

Current Ontario colored cheese was one eighth of a cent higher at the close of last week. This has ended the week at 11 to 11 1/2 cents a pound. Receipts were heavier. Arrivals last week totaled 32,317 boxes as against 30,320 boxes the previous week. Only a small amount of cheese was exported last week. About 550 went to the West Indies and Newfoundland with the remainder going to the United Kingdom.

New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island green mountain potatoes held steady at 20 to 25 cents per 50 pound bag. No change was recorded in this line throughout the week.

CURRENCY

NEW YORK, June 18—Traders marked time on the New York Foreign Exchange market Saturday to await the outcome of currency stabilization negotiations proceeding at London.

The Canadian dollar recovered an initial recession to wind up unchanged at 88 1/2 cents, representing a premium on United States funds of 12 1/2 percent.

Sterling moved within a range of 3/4 of a cent and closed at 84.07 1/2, down 3/4 of a cent from Friday's final quotations. London cables report \$4.05 a likely rate for stabilization.

MONTREAL, June 17—Foreign currencies advanced on Montreal foreign exchange with the pound sterling and the United States dollar both turning upward. The pound firmed 9-16 of a cent at 84.55 1/2, while the premium on American funds rose 1/4 of one cent to 12 1/2 per cent. Premium, the French franc held unchanged at 4.34 cents.
