**Ordained**

Ordination to the holy priesthood took place in the Holy Cross Cathedral, Boston, Mass., on the morning of April 11th, 1930. A class of thirty young men were elevated to the sublime dignity of Christ's eternal priesthood by His Eminence William Cardinal O'Connell, of Boston. Among the candidates for ordination was the Rev. Alfred Bernard MacDonald of Springfield, Lot 67. He is a son of the late Ronald MacDonald, who died sixteen months ago. His mother Mrs. Mary MacDonald, still lives on the old homestead, and has been an invalid for thirteen years. It was a source of great happiness and unprecedented pleasure to Father MacDonald's mother to learn of his ordination. It seemed to alleviate her sufferings as she vied with the other members of her family when the glad news of his ordination was flashed over the wire to his many friends and relatives on Prince Edward Island. Immediately after ordination Father MacDonald wired his mother his first priestly blessing.

Holy Cross Cathedral was beautifully and artistically arranged for the Ordination ceremonies. The immense cathedral was packed to the doors, many people were unable to gain entrance to the cathedral as the doors were closed as soon as the immense edifice was filled. Thousands waited outside during the entire ceremony. The friends and relatives of Father MacDonald greeted him at the Cathedral school hall, where they all received his priestly blessing.

Father MacDonald made his collegiate studies in the various Catholic colleges throughout the United States. In the fall of 1924 Father MacDonald entered Mt. St. Mary's College Emmittsburg Md., as a junior. In 1926 he graduated from the college with honor. The following September he entered Mt. St. Mary's Seminary, where he pursued his theological studies. Having completed his course he was ordained to the holy priesthood on April 11th, 1930.

On Easter Sunday morning Father MacDonald sang his first solemn Mass, in St. Paul's Church, Cambridge, Mass. The deacon of the Mass was the Rev. Daniel Golden, the sub-deacon Rev. Doctor McShane, Master of Ceremonies, Rev. William Gunn, and the Arch-priest Rev. Augustine J. Hickey, Rector of St. Paul's Church.

The sermon was preached by the Rev. Pastor. He stressed the greatness and sublimity of the Eternal Priesthood and portrayed in beautiful and forceful language the priest as an "Alter Christus." He congratulated Father MacDonald on his successful endeavor in reaching the Priesthood. The Rev. Father Hickey paid a beautiful tribute to the newly ordained priest's invalid mother.

St. Paul's immense choir of over five hundred voices sang the Mass. The choir was divided into two sections known respectively as the sanctuary choir and the regular choir which sang from the choir loft. Both choirs alternated in singing the responses. The singing was beautiful. At the conclusion of the Mass the choir under the capable leadership of Professor Ecker, circled in V shape around Father MacDonald and sang "Tu es Sacerdos in Aeternum." It was a beautiful climax to a most marvelous ceremony. The beautiful new Church of St. Paul's was crowded to the doors.

A dinner and reception was tendered to Father MacDonald at the home of Mr. and Mrs. James Shreehan. Hundreds of people called upon Father MacDonald to receive his priestly blessing and to wish him many years of active service in the Master's vineyard.

Father MacDonald intends visiting his mother and other members of his family around the latter part of May. Due to the pressure of business Father will not be able to leave Boston any earlier. The Rev. Father intends spending the entire summer with his mother and many friends on Prince Edward Island.

**IN MEMORIAM**

**MRS. DUNCAN MCLEOD**

On Thursday, March 13th, Mrs. Duncan McLeod, a very highly esteemed resident of Dartington passed peacefully away at the ripe old age of 89 years.

The deceased had been in a rather poor condition of health for over a year so that the coming of the end was not unexpected. She was possessed of a strong, rugged constitution and even up until a short time before her death she was at times able to move about the house. But her goodly supply of reserve energy gradually waned until on the above mentioned date her gentle spirit winged its heavenly flight. Mr. Duncan McLeod, husband of deceased passed away some twenty years ago. Mrs. McLeod now lives to mourn the loss of a kind and loving mother one son and three daughters. The son is Malcolm McLeod, on the old homestead, Dartington and the daughters are Mrs. A. J. Sutherland, Boston, Mass., Mrs. Harvey P. Johnstone, Wollaston, Mass., and Mrs. Colonel Allan McLeod, Hartsville. Three sons and a daughter predeceased their mother at different intervals during the past forty two years. These were John McLeod, killed in Western Canada, some 35 years ago, Allan McLeod, drowned in Maine, nineteen years ago, and Daniel McLeod who died in Roxbury, Mass., in 1909. Another daughter Isabella McLeod, passed away about forty two years ago at the age of three years.

The deceased was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Allan McSwain, formerly of Belle River. When she was quite young her parents moved to Hopedale, here the family made their future home. There were in all nine members in the family, six brothers and three sisters. All of the other members predeceased Mrs. McLeod. None now remain.

Mrs. McLeod was a lady who was quite widely known and was held in high esteem by all. She took a deep interest in all that pertained to the welfare of the school, the church and the community and was ever ready to help on any good cause. In times of sickness and sorrow no one could be kinder than she was and no one ever called upon her for aid in vain. To her home all worthy comers found a hearty welcome. She gave them of her best and to them the latch-string was always out. She was a loyal member of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and ever stood true to its doctrine. In her younger days her place in the sanctuary was seldom or never found vacant.

The coming of the end had no fears for her. She often spoke of her eternal home and at times longed for the day when the great God and Father of all would come to take her to be with Himself. "She knew in whom she had believed and she was persuaded that He was able to keep what she had committed to His trust against that day." The end was peace. The funeral was held on the afternoon of Saturday, March 15th. The service was conducted by Rev. R. Hensley Stavert. The pall bearers were Messrs. Dougald McPherson, Anthony Clarkin, Alexander McLennan, Alexander B. McLeod, John McLennan, Sr., and Allan Cummings. Interment was in the Hartsville Cemetery.
