CARVELL BROS. SHIPPING NEWS

This branch of business of the old established firm of Carvell Bros. in this City, has through careful attention been steadily growing during the past few years, the result being that today their steamship business is one of the largest transacted in the Maritime Provinces.

The present indications point to a season of great activity in the shipping line.

S. S. Campana of the Quebec Steamship Co. will run this year as heretofore, between Montreal and Charlottetown, and in all probability S. S. Trinidad of the same line which made several successful trips last year from Quebec to New York calling at Charlottetown, will likely resume the same route.

The Daged of the Dobbell Line will not be here this year owing to the new Canadian Coasting Law passed recently prohibiting Norwegian vessels from trading with Canadian Ports.

The purpose however bringing out two smaller steamers from England thus enabling a weekly service between Charlottetown and Newfoundland, this will doubtless be greatly appreciated, as the consumption of Island produce in Newfoundland is yearly increasing.

S. S. "City of Ghent" of the Pickford and Black Line will ply as in former years from Charlottetown to Halifax taking in the ports along the Nova Scotia Shore.

This firm also represents the Allan Line Steamship Co., and the Furness Withey Line.

It is worthy of note that the latest improvement of the Allan Line is the Wireless Long Distance apparatus. The steamer will therefore be in touch with news centres on both sides of the Atlantic from the time of leaving one side until the other is reached. Daily despatches of notable events will be published on board, and passengers will be able to communicate at any time even from mid-Atlantic with their friends at home.
