

BUTTER AND CHEESE EXPORTS TO UNITED STATES

We learn from statistics supplied by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, that despite the new United States tariff, our export of butter to that country in January, 1923, was greater than in the corresponding month of last year, being 491,466 lbs. against 155,828 lbs. For the ten months ending January 31, 1923, it was, however, somewhat less than in the corresponding ten months ending on the same date in 1922, being 3,220,344 lbs. against 2,894,583 lbs. Cheese was much in excess in 1922-23 of 1921-22, being 5,880,500 lbs. compared with 2,564,844. So, too, was the export over the border of powdered milk in excess in 1922-23 compared with 1921-22 the returns reading 1,472,653 lbs. against 322,185 lbs.
