A Year's Benefactions.

The year 1899 was a period of prosperity more especially for the men at the head of great enterprises. Multi-millionaires added to their millions as they had not done for a long time, but it is a pleasure to record that they did not keep all the money themselves. There has never been a year, in the United States at least, when so large an amount of money was given in public gifts. Universities, colleges, hospitals, art galleries, libraries have been enriched. The total amount given for these purposes in the twelve months is put down at \$62,750,000, compared with \$38,000,000 in 1898 and \$45,000,000 in 1897. To this enormous sum of money Mr. Carnegie contributed \$5,000,000 most of which went to the libraries, and besides he gave half a million dollars to institutions outside the United States. Mr. Carnegie was generous in his gifts, but he is not impoverished for the amount given hardly represents his increase profits in the year. Another resident of Pennsylvania, Mr. Widener, of Philadelphia, gave \$2,000,000 for a home and hospital for crippled children, and also thirty-six acres of land for a site for the institution. Mr. Rockefeller, of Standard Oil fame, gave away three-quarters of a million dollars, as well as guaranteeing to duplicate all gifts up to \$2,000,000 to Chicago University. The university has succeeded in raising two million, and Mr. Rockefeller will have to put up two million more. Cornelius Vanderbilt contributed over a million dollars. Edward Austin, of Boston, \$1,100,000, and other rich men large sums. The greatest benefactor of all, however, is a woman—Mrs. Leland Stanford, whose gift of property having a cash value of \$15,000,000 to Stanford University, has previously been mentioned in the papers, and make a record that will not be often equalled.

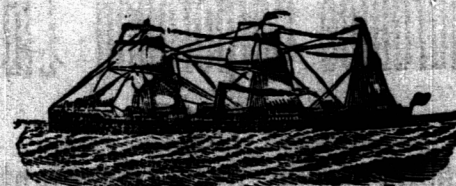
DIED.
