With One Seat Still in the Doubtful Column, Liberals Have Elected 119 Members, Conservatives 89, Other Parties 35- Nova Scotia and British Columbia Almost Solidly Conservative - Parliament Will Likely Meet in November.

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—The Conservative government of Right Hon. Arthur Meighen met with defeat at the polls yesterday.

The members of the government in addition to Premier Meighen who were defeated yesterday are: Hon. J. C. Elton, former Minister of Labor, Health and Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, and two ministers without portfolio, Hon. Donald Sutherland and Hon. Raymond Morand.

The former Ministers in the King government in addition to Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, who were elected yesterday are: Hon. Ernest Lapointe, former Minister of Justice, Hon. P. J. A. Carlin, former Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Hon. Lucien Caumon, former Solicitor General; Hon. J. A. Robb, former Minister of Finance, Hon. J. C. Elton, former Minister of Labor, Health and Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, Hon. W. R. Mitchell, former Minister of Agriculture, Hon. C. A. Deming, former Minister of Railways; Hon. J. King, former Minister of Public Works, and Hon. Charles Stewart, former Minister of the Interior.

IRELAND A CANDIDATE FOR COUNCIL SEAT

Sir George Foster Amends Declaration that None of the Dominions Was a Candidate for 9th Place on League Council.

(Special to The Guardian) GENEVA, Sept. 15.—A sharp fight is developing in the League for the 9th non-permanent seat on the Council, which was originally considered as safe for Portugal.

Canada has notified all the dominion delegations that in spite of their decision not to demand a seat on the council, Ireland is a candidate for the place, and that she is wholeheartedly convinced that she is best serving the interests of the Dominions as a whole by pressing her claim.

In view of this statement Sir George Foster has amended his declaration that none of the Dominions was a candidate for the 9th place, making his explanation on behalf of Ireland.

GENEVA, Sept. 15.—Sir George Foster of Canada said before the League Assembly today that Canada favors distribution of Council seats on a geographic basis, but thinks the League should not tie its hands for years to come by dividing the world into water-tight compartments.

He opposed the granting of three seats to South America and opposed encouraging racial and cultural divisions in the League. The League, he contended, should be maintained as a world organization in which "a man is a man."

Ludendorff Weds MUNICH, Bavaria, Sept. 15.—General Erich Ludendorff, who was Quartermaster-General of the German Imperial Army in the world war, was married at noon today to Frau Dr. Mathilde von Kemnitz. The bride who was mentioned by the first Frau Ludendorff in the divorce proceedings in July, is a specialist on nervous diseases.

The marriage ceremony which was strictly private, was performed by the local registrar at the bride's home at Tatzing, on Starberg Lake. Ludendorff is 61 years old.

William Brown. Arrested CHARGED WITH MANSLAUGHTER IN CONNECTION WITH THE DEATH OF THE LATE CHARLES E. MACDONALD.

As a result of the verdict of the coroner's jury investigating into the death of the late Charles E. MacDonald, William Brown, C. N. R. brakeman who was driving the Studebaker car of Mrs. Agnes Crosby on the night of the fatality at Borden was arrested on the charge of manslaughter. He was taken in charge by Police Officer Watson Higgins in Charlottetown on Monday night. Officer Higgins is executing the warrant ten minutes after he received Mr. Brown was detained in Charlottetown until Tuesday morning when he was taken to Summerside.

TWO DIE IN ONTARIO IN EATING TOADSTOOLS LONDON, Ont. Sept. 15.—Two of the six persons who became ill on Saturday after eating toadstools, which they mistook for mushrooms, died yesterday in Victoria Hospital—John Marks, and his daughter Annie, aged six. Two of the remaining four are critically ill, and little hope is held for their recovery. They are Mrs. Marks and her son Johnny, aged 1. Annie Marks was the first to succumb dying early in the morning, while the father succumbed in the afternoon. Both experienced great agony.

Induction Service At Zion Church Last Night

Before a large congregation, Rev. Marcus Scott Fulton, B. A., was inducted last night as minister of Zion Presbyterian Church, the charge being read to him by the Moderator of the Session, Rev. A. D. Stewart, who was assisted by Rev. R. H. Stavert, and the congregation by Rev. George S. Mitchell, Rev. Finlay Macintosh also took part in the service.

The sermon was delivered by Rev. Mr. Muir, who spoke eloquently on the text, "The stone which the builders rejected became the headstone of the corner." In speaking on this subject Mr. Muir said that it was sometimes a failing of specialists and experts to miss things that were very apparent to the common people. A great botanist, although he had a thorough knowledge of flowers, had one time failed to recognize the fathead when he saw it.

So it had been, said the preacher, with Jesus Christ when he was on earth. The Pharisees, learned as they were in the promised coming of a Messiah, did not recognize him in Jesus Christ. Consequently Jesus had made use of this same text to illustrate their blindness.

But, said the preacher, the stone could be used to typify not only Jesus, but all his followers. Like St. Peter they could and should be the living stones of which the Christian Church is built. And they should not be dead stones, there were already too many of those in the Church today.

The induction service throughout was very impressive, and lasted for almost two hours. At its conclusion a social was held in Zion Church school room, at which an opportunity was given for the members of the congregation to meet and become acquainted with Mr. Fulton.

These present were Rev. W. B. Muir, Moderator, Rev. R. H. Stavert, Rev. G. S. Mitchell, Rev. D. McLean, Rev. M. Scott Fulton, Rev. F. G. McIntosh, Home Mission Secretary of the Maritime Provinces, Rev. Andrew Brown and Messrs. Murdoch Ross, Wm. McMillan and Donald McKinnon, Alex. McDonald and Murdoch McLennan, Elders, and Messrs. Sylvanus Bohrer and D. Stewart, representatives.

The reading of the minutes of the last meeting was waived and held as read. The first matter dealt with was a call from Tynes Valley addressed to Rev. Andrew Brown, Ireland. The call was largely signed and accompanied by a guarantee of the usual adequate stipend together with the usual holidays. On being extended to Mr. Brown it was accepted by him.

The induction service was arranged for as follows: Rev. G. S. Mitchell, Moderator of Tynes Valley Session will preside and induct, Rev. M. S. Fulton will preach, Rev. R. H. Stavert will address the newly inducted minister and Rev. W. B. Muir the people.

The induction will take place in the Tynes Valley Church at 2.30 p. m. on Tuesday, Sept. 21st. Rev. Jos. C. Harrison was appointed to the New London congregation for a period of six months, dating from Sept. 1st and looking forward to the induction at a later period.

The induction of Rev. M. S. Fulton into the pastorate of Zion Church then followed in the manner reported elsewhere in this issue.

After the induction service was over some routine business was disposed of and the meeting adjourned to meet at Tynes Valley on Tuesday, Sept. 21st at 2.30 p. m. The Presbytery was then closed with the benediction.

Toronto Strongly Conservative

(Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, Sept. 15.—Toronto, and the Yorks have maintained their Tory reputation, leading 12 Conservatives into the sixteenth parliament of Canada. The Tory "machine" operated vigorously and efficiently, and not only did all Liberals and labor men go down to defeat, but the three Independent Conservatives who sought to buck their way into parliamentary ranks suffered the same fate.

Mob Attack Home of Defeated Candidate

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Sept. 15.—Gerrilla warfare followed the defeat of H. Beique, Conservative by J. V. A. Langlois, Liberal in Chambly-Verchères counties, according to accounts reaching here. A mob who attempted to gain admittance to the defeated candidate's home in Chambly-Bash were driven off only after Mr. Beique fired two bullets from a revolver and a party of his friends formed a cordon about the dwelling.

Thornton and His Bride in New York

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 15.—Sir Henry W. Thornton, head of the Canadian National Railways and his bride, who was Miss Martha Watrous, Westbury, N. Y., were in New York today preparing for their honeymoon after a visit to this city yesterday when they obtained a marriage license.

Reports that they had been married a second time in the chambers of Judge J. Willis Martin could not be definitely confirmed although Judge Martin intimated that he had performed the ceremony.

The reported second marriage was an incompatibility. Under the New York state law the respondent in a divorce action based on grounds not recognized by this divorce law, no matter in what state the divorce was granted.

In the application for the license yesterday Sir Henry gave his age as 55, 28 years older than his wife.

Forke Pleased With Election Results

(Canadian Press) BRANFORD, Man., Sept. 15.—"The federal election results are very satisfactory," declared Robert Forke, former leader of the Progressive party, when interviewed here today.

Mr. Forke, who retained his seat in Brandon, having the endorsement of both the Liberal and Progressive parties, added the results were particularly gratifying both from a dominion and provincial viewpoint.

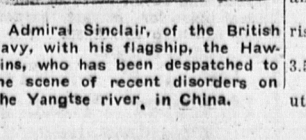

Liberal Candidates Lose Their Deposits

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Sept. 15.—Nine candidates in the Toronto and Yorks lost their deposits in the voting yesterday. There will be other additions to the total figure, but it is not expected that the result will be materially affected.

The Liberal candidates in the Toronto and Yorks losing their deposits were—Shipway, in Toronto South; Murdoch, in Toronto High Park; Tipping in Parkdale; Hunter in West York; Boyd in Toronto Northwest; Dr. Walker, in Toronto-Scarboro; and Miss Bennett, in Toronto East; both Labor candidates—Shannon, in Toronto North-west and MacDonald in West Centre—also lost their deposits.

Each of the candidates who lost deposits will forfeit \$200 to the Dominion Government.

NEW ZEALAND ASKS FOR CANADIAN TRADE

British Island Dominion Displays its Wares and Displays its Attractions at Canadian National Exhibition.

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 15.—"If you cannot buy in Canada will you trade with us?" This was the slogan of the delegation of six sent by the New Zealand Government with an exhibit valued at \$200,000, as a "gesture of friendship" to the Canadian nation.

The exhibit from the British Island Dominion at the Canadian National Exhibition was the first of its kind from New Zealand, to which dominion Canada sends products, mainly wool and parts valued at \$20,000,000 annually while the imports to Canada from that remote country do not exceed \$3,000,000 a year.

The exhibit did not contain any showing of two of its chief export products—meat and dairy produce—of which \$150,000,000 represented the yearly value of export to Great Britain, but the statistical position New Zealand occupies in the export trade of the world was emphasized by comparative graphical representation.

The court attractively displayed the industries of the country, with interesting trophies of Maori arts and crafts and products of Western Samoa, so successfully administered by that government under mandate from the League of Nations. The thermal regions where underneath a very thin crust, the earth seems to be always boiling; specimens of deep-sea denizens, weighing in the case of the swordfish up to 1,000 pounds; charts on the New Zealand method of feeding babies under which they claim the infantile death rate has been reduced to 3 per thousand births in the main cities, compared with 20 per thousand in the main centres of North America; cinema films of travel in New Zealand; in fact, a ready reference to life and activity in all phases there were all given in this interesting display.

The exhibit opened up new avenues of trade and tourist business and was widely commended. The British Industries Federation in London cabled to the New Zealand Court at the Canadian National congratulating it on its display.

Famous Mexican Matador Injured

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Sept. 15.—Juan Silveti, Mexico's most famous matador may have fought his last bull fight. On the eve of his retirement, Silveti, called "without fear," was wounded Sunday in a fight at Nuevo Laredo. Just as he poised his blade and prepared to kill the last bull of the fight the animal charged, tossing the matador to the ground, and severely gashing his right leg.

Silveti, clad in his bright silks and jewels was carried, dripping a long trail of blood, to a hospital where after an operation, it was announced that his condition was improved but that he was still in danger.

Can't Face Facts

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 15.—Long training for work is not yet a part of woman's philosophy, and she often finds facts hard to meet. This statement from Dr. Elizabeth Baker, professor of economics at Barnard College, Columbia, preceded an outline to delegates of the fourth international congress of university women of scientific attempts in the United States to reconcile housekeeping for university women.

She named Vassar, Smith College, the Merrill Palmer School in Detroit, the bureau of vocational information of New York and inquiries into the economic status of women by the department of agriculture at Washington as efforts to solve women's difficulty in the dual task of home and profession.

According to a laundry expert the causes of ruined collars are stiff beads, pointed collar buttons, and bulky neckties. Another cause, not mentioned by the expert is laundries.

Ocean Craft May Be Longest in World

GLASGOW, Sept. 15.—The possibility that an ocean liner 1000 ft. long may be built here is indicated in inquiries received by Clyde Shipbuilders.

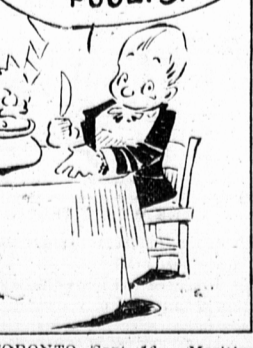
The inquiries believed to be from the Cunard Line, were as to the feasibility of constructing and operating such a ship, which would be the longest in the world.
