ELECTION NOTICE.

Plebiscite on Civic Ownership of a Plant for Street, Commercial and Domestic Lighting.

Pursuant to a Resolution passed by the citizens of the City of Charlottetown at a meeting at the Market Hall on January 20th, 1905, Electors are requested to vote, on THURSDAY, the 9th day of February, inst.

For or against Civic Ownership of a Plant for Street, Commercial and Domestic Lighting. Each voter shall vote at the polling place in the Ward or division thereof wherein he or she resides, and not elsewhere; and shall state the qualification in respect of which he claims the right to vote, which shall be taken down and entered in separate columns in the poll books.

A vote will be taken at the several places, that is to say: In Ward 1, at or near the office of John McQuillan, Queen Street. In Ward 2, at or near the House of Mrs. Thomas Connolly, opposite Mr. R. Heartz's warehouse, Sydney Street, between Great George and Prince Streets.

In Ward 3, at or near the Market House. In Ward 4, at or near the City Hall, corner of Kent and Queen Streets. In Ward 5 West, at or near the McMahon's Shop, on Great George Street. In Ward 5 East, at or near Mrs. Heustis' Shop, on Great George Street. And the Poll will be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon and continue open until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

DESCRIPTION OF WARDS: No. 1 shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Dorchester Street, and the parcel of land formerly known as the Military Barrack Ground.

No. 2 shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Richmond Street, and north of Dorchester Street. No. 3 shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Grafton Street, and north of Richmond Street.

No. 4 shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Fitzroy Street, and north of Grafton Street. No. 5 shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies north of Fitzroy Street, including the Common of the said town.
