FINLAND IS UNITED FOR PROHIBITION

Bill Prohibiting Manufacture or Importation of Liquor Passed by Unanimous Vote and Awaits Czar's Sanction

HELSINGFORS, Finland, Nov. 1.—(Special)—The Diet today adopted unanimously without a roll call the alcohol bill, prohibiting the manufacture of alcohol in Finland and its importation into Finland.

Great Britain's Airship Secret Closely Kept

THE DISASTER IN TURKESTAN OVERSTATED
