The death occurred at Ellerslie, on Tuesday night of Mr. William McQuarrie after an illness of nine days of inflammation of the lungs. He was 45 years of age and leaves a wife and six young children. Deceased was highly respected and will be missed in the community.

The number of spectators was also much larger than usual. The ice was in perfect condition. The Summerside Cornet Band discoursed its very best music during the evening.

A MEETING was held last Wednesday, the 14th inst, in the Presbyterian Church, Lot 10, when a Woman's Foreign Missionary Society was organized by the Presbyterian President, Miss Lillian Muirhead of Summerside. The following officers were chosen:—President, Mrs. McGregor; Vice-President, Miss Carr; Secretary, Mrs. Linkletter; Treasurer, Miss Campbell.

It will be remembered that during some months past reports have been given of thieving operations in different parts of the country. On the night of Wednesday last the store of Mr. F. W. Cannon, St. Eleonors was entered, and goods to the value of about 100 dollars were taken. The thieves in this case left a mit. Mr. Frank Cannon and a neighbor proceeded to find an owner for it, and succeeded in locating his habitation although at the time of their call he was not at home to visitors. Search warrants were issued and a house occupied by Mr. John Perry his wife and sister, at Raynor's Creek, near Travellers Rest, was searched. Only the women were at home and they finding that the game was up confessed to having some thing concealed in the cellar. The Constables, Messrs. Daley and Mountain, had no difficulty in finding the goods and identifying them as Mr. Cannon's. Yesterday morning Mr. Nelson Hooper, whose grainary was raided some time ago, procured a search warrant and with Policeman McDonald, visited the Perry residence. A search resulted in finding a number of empty bags belonging to Mr. Hooper, also a barrel of flour, which Mrs. Perry admitted had been filled from Mr. Hooper's bags. They also owned to having received quantities of other goods, the loss of which has been reported. A mulatto named Prcost is one of the gang and the constables are now looking for him and Perry.

A Spy Shot.

NEW YORK, February 14.—A story sent to the Paris Temps from its correspondent at Durban which tells of the execution of an English lighthouse keeper, who was a spy in the service of the Boers, is printed by the Herald to-day.

One day while a troopship was passing the high promontory on which the lighthouse is situated, an officer's attention was attracted by singular heliograph signals that were being made on the other side of the lighthouse. The keeper was watched and it was found that by the use of the ordinary heliograph code he signalled each new arrival of troops, each movement in the port, number of men, cannon and horses embarked to accomplices situated on a mountain some distance away. These messages were repeated from post to post and reached the Boer headquarters on the Tugela river in two or three days and had been going on for some time since the outbreak of the war. The keeper eventually confessed he was paid 300 dollars for each telegram, and before beginning, his operations had received 3,500 dollars on account. His guilt was proved by an examination of his account at the Transvaal National bank, which has a branch at Durban, and which paid him the money. He was a full bred Englishman, sixty years old, and had been employed in the lighthouse for a long time. His wife and five children would not believe in his guilt, and a painful scene took place when he was transferred on board a man-of-war where he was shot.

Big Guns For America.

LONDON, Feb. 12.—The new powerful 14-pounder guns made by Vickers' Sons & Maxim for the United States government have just been passed through a series of searching tests. It is claimed that the breech mechanism is practically automatic in its action, that the gun has a muzzle velocity of 2,650 feet a second, and a muzzle energy of 631 feet; that it can fire twenty-six rounds a minute, weighs only 1,750 pounds, and will perforate 10.2 inches of wrought iron or 7.9 inches of steel plate, according to the Gaves formula.


