At the close of the meeting it was moved by Wm Sweet seconded by Fred Bremner and carried that the subject for next might be "Resolved That the sword has done more for the civilization of the world than the pen."

THE attendance at the lecture of Rev. T. F. Fullerton in St. James' Hall last evening was again very large, indicating unabated interest in this popular series. The lecturer was in his best form, and in dealing with Buller's campaign on the Tugela and the relief of Ladysmith had one of the most thrilling chapters of the war to deal with. The battles of Colenso, Spion Kop and many minor engagements including the determined assault of the Boers on Ladysmith were very clearly and forcefully portrayed, a heartfelt tribute paid to the valor of the Irish troops, and the lecturer rose to eloquence in describing the scenes which followed the relief of the beleaguered town. The next lecture, on Tuesday evening next will deal with the march from Bloemfontein to Pretoria with the Canadians. The final lecture of the course, on Thursday, March 21st will describe the return from Pretoria to Charlottetown.

THE people of Canada Cove were favored on the evening of the 22nd inst. with a lecture on "Farm and Dairy" from Mr. Ewen McMillan of New Haven. The lecturer discussed the matter from a point of science and practical experience. Experience had proved that the old methods of farming adopted by our fathers had caused such a demand of plant food from the soil and admitted so small a return that our farms are now suffering from the effect and should these methods be persisted in it is evident that our farms would in future time become exhausted. In the Dairy Industry we have a remedy for this threatening evil. While yielding more money to the farmer it also admits so great a return of nutriment to the soil that tends to increase productivity. The necessity of keeping good stock was made evident. Experience had proved that the profit from a good cow may be overbalanced with loss from a bad one. The advantages of judicious rations, warm stables, and kind treatment were fully discussed, and altogether the lecture was pleasing and profitable. At the close of the lecture remarks were made and questions asked by several present.
