IN MEMORIAM

THE LATE MR. J. GEORGE CARVER

The announcement of the death of Mr. George Carver, familiarly known as "The Oyster King" will be learned with much regret.

He was not generally known that he was seriously ill, for only a fortnight ago he was about his business as usual, but he passed away at his home, 286 Grand Street at an early hour Saturday morning.

He was only 52 years of age—in the prime of manhood.

The late Mr. Carver was a native of Charlottetown and spent his life in this city. Besides his restaurant business, which he carried on for many years on Kent Street, and up to the time of his demise, Mr. Carver was extensively engaged in the Lobster Packing Industry.

He was the first to pack that delicacy known as "rare-bit," which found ready sale in the larger centers of the city.

Mr. Carver made oysters the feature of his business, and was well entitled to the name which appeared upon his sign, "The Oyster King." Besides his business operations he took a very lively and active interest in sports, especially in horse racing, being the owner of some very speedy horses. He leaves to mourn a widow and family of eight children.

DEATH OF MR. A. R. NEWSOM—Citizens will regret to learn of the death of A. R. Newsom, which occurred at the P. E. Island Hospital, Friday. Mr. Newsom, who has not been in the best of health for some time, was a well known returned soldier, having enlisted in the 5th Battalion Band at Amherst, N.S., at the outbreak of the war. Contracting a severe cold overseas he was invalided home and spent considerable time at the Sanatorium at Kentville. When he improved in health he removed to this city, where he has since been living, enjoying a pension. Some of the older members of the sporting fraternity will remember Mr. Newsom as at one time the champion roller and ice skater in this province, defeating the best of the speedy ones. The late Mr. Newsom is survived by two brothers, Mr. W. H. Newsom, the well known law and commercial stationer of Toronto and Mr. Bert Newsom of the C. N. R. shops here. The funeral will be held on receipt of instructions from his brother in Toronto.
