The death occurred yesterday evening at the Charlottetown Hospital of Alexander MacLeod, well-known and popular Charlottetown business man. He was 60 years of age.

The late Mr. MacLeod had conducted a retail grocery business at the corner of Bayfield and Queen Streets for many years and by his genial disposition and willingness to indulge had endeared himself to hundreds of people in his immediate vicinity.

Born in Glasgow Road, he came to the City about 40 years ago with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Angus MacLeod, and thereafter made Charlottetown his home.

He is survived by his wife, the former Bertha Doyle of Charlottetown; three sons, James, Stanley, and Alfred; and two daughters, Agnes and Edith (Mrs. Nutbrown of Sherbrooke, P.Q.); one brother, John Archibald of Glasgow Road, and two sisters, Aileen, Mrs. Frank Coles, Cabot, Mass., and Mrs. M. Roy McGee, Charlottetown.

Czechs And Russians Sign Trade Agreement

PRAGUE, July 13 (AP) — Czechoslovakia and Russia announced Saturday night a five-year agreement exchanging Russian food for Czech machinery and manufactured goods.

It was viewed as possibly setting up a basis for an eastern European economy of barter for countries not participating in the Marshall plan.

Informal sources said it seemed likely here that Poland and other Eastern European states which turned their backs on the Paris conference might have been offered similar increased trade pacts.

Memorial Service At New London

A very impressive Memorial Service and unveiling of a new monument, dedicated to the memory of those who died in the Second Great War, was held at the Geddie Memorial Church, New London, yesterday afternoon.

The service, which was attended by nearly a thousand people, was opened by the mass singing of the hymn "O God Our Help in Ages Past" and was followed by a prayer conducted by Rev. D. A. Campbell. After the Scripture reading by Rev. D. E. Noel, the monument was unveiled by Mr. W. J. Seaman.

The laying of wreaths by the Canadian Legion and many others present was followed by a special number by the Trinity United Church choir of Summerside and soloist Mrs. Leigh Callbeck.

A very stirring address was given by Rev. G. S. Stevens, after which the choir rendered another special selection.

The reading of the names from the monument of those who fell in the First Great War was followed by the playing of "The Star Spangled Banner" and the playing of the new monument of those who paid the supreme sacrifice in the Second Great War, after which the "Last Post" was sounded by the bugler, followed by a two minute silence, which ended with the sounding of the Reveille. A special number by the choir and a prayer by Rev. D. E. Noel, preceded a few remarks by the chairman, Rev. D. A. Campbell, in which he thanked all those who assisted in the ceremonies.

All present participated in the singing of "Onward Christian Soldiers."

The Guard of Honor which was in attendance was made up of members of the Canadian Legion, represented by veterans of both wars, and was under the command of Lieut. Col. E. W. Johnston.

The service was concluded by the singing of "The King" and the pronouncing of the Benediction by Rev. G. S. Stevens.
