East - West Football Title Game Slated For Saturday

TORONTO, Nov. 14.—The east-west football game for the Canadian championship probably will be played Saturday, Dec. 10, in Toronto, Ottawa or Montreal, though the Canadian Rugby Union hasn't got around yet to worrying much about the classic. Either Winnipeg Blue Bombers or Calgary Bronks will represent the west. The Bombers, Canadian champions in 1935 and runners-up to Toronto Argonauts last year, won the Western Canada Union title by beating the Bronks, Striped of C. R. U. ineligible, in the death game Saturday to determine which travels east.

In the other sector the contenders are Argonauts and Ottawa Roughriders in the Big Four, Saskatchewan Imperials and Montreal Nationals in the O. R. F. U. Argos and Roughriders are scheduled to play a home-and-home, total-points series Nov. 19 in Toronto and Nov. 26 in Ottawa. On the same dates Nationals and Imperials decide the C. R. F. U. title. This is the eastern final between the O. R. F. U. and Big Four champions can not be played before Dec. 3 and the Canadian final before Dec. 10.

Pick All Star Rugby Team From West

WINNIPEG, Nov. 14.—(CP)—Two men so great in their positions they could miss more than half the Western Interprovincial Football Union schedule but still win recognition as included in the second annual Canadian All-Star Western All-Star Team selected by coaches and sports editors.

Fritz Hanson, golden ghost of the Winnipeg backfield, and team Griffling, Regina, coach and snapper, warmed the bench much of the season because of injuries but the elusive Hanson lacked no vote of unanimous selection and Griffling, former Kansas State centre, only two.

Jeff Nicklin, 24-year-old son of Percy Nicklin, who captained the Moncton Hawks hockey team, won all-star recognition for the second successive year. An outside, Nicklin plays for Winnipeg.

Winnipeg Blue Bombers, who defeated Calgary Bronks 26-9 in the two-game union title series, placed six men, Regina Roughriders, three, Bronks two and Edmonton Eskimos one in their first year in the circuit.

Notre Dame Is Headed For New Championship

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Nov. 14.—(AP)—Notre Dame's 1938 football forces are just around the corner from the 10th undefeated, untied season, and possibly the fourth United States championship, in Irish gridiron history, but head Coach Knute Rockne insisted today, "we're not even thinking of that now."

"We don't play for a national championship but to win the next game," said Layden, one of the 1924 United States championship team's famous "Four Horsemen." Then, at the end of the season, if a championship is ours, so much the better.

Around the campus, though, there is plenty of talk about another undefeated-untied and another United States title. The Consensus is that Layden's boys already have conquered their strongest opponent and if the luck of the Irish continues they will wind up their schedule with victories over Northwestern Saturday and Southern California Dec. 3. Notre Dame's victims this season have been Kansas, Georgia Tech, Illinois, Carnegie Tech, Army, Navy and Minnesota.

In any event, Notre Dame will not perform in a post-season game, such as the annual Rose Bowl Classic. The school adopted a rule in 1926 prohibiting a post-season appearance in any sport.

Unable To Accept Invitation To Cricket Tour

TORONTO, Nov. 14.—(CP)—Canadian cricket authorities are unable to accept the Marylebone Cricket Club's invitation to send a representative team to England next summer. A. A. Dodge, secretary of the Canadian Cricket Advisory Board, stated today various difficulties had arisen to make such a tour impossible but it was hoped to send a team in 1941.

Early this year the M. C. C., impressed with the showing made by Canadian players against the English touring team of 1937, invited Dominion officials to sponsor a tour in 1938 or 1941 in which Canadian cricketers would meet some of the first-class and minor counties and the universities.

If suitable arrangements are made there is a possibility an Australian team may visit Canada in 1939. Some months ago Australian cricketers proposed a tour for last summer but it was impossible to arrange matters through lack of time.
