WHITE A SOLDIER.

OTTAWA, August 26—The versatility of the Hon. W. T. White, which has passed triumphantly thru every test to date, is now being put to another trial. Mr. White, besides being minister of finance, has performed the duties of acting minister of justice during the absence of Hon. C. J. Doherty. He has now discovered that he is also minister of militia in the room instead of the absent minister, Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes. This comes as something as a shock to Mr. White, who claims to be a man of peace. He is however, as befits a soldier, obeying orders and tomorrow night he will speak to the visiting cadets from England at a dinner to be given by Colonel Percy Sherwood. On Wednesday he goes to Rockcliffe to see the shooting of the D. R. A. meet and will likely address the marksmen.

BOSTON FISHING NEWS.

BOSTON, Aug. 26—Two of the fleet of steam trawlers with fresh fish and two small crafts comprised the only arrivals at T. Wharf, Boston, Saturday.

Trade was not very rushing on groundfish, for Saturday is generally a pretty poor day in fish circles. The Herring had about 40,000 pounds of groundfish and 4,000 pounds of lemon soles and the Foam 31,000 pounds and 600 pounds of lemon soles.

The two mackerel fares were schrs. Charles A. Dyer with 1300 large and mediums and Little Fannie with 900 large fish. Large mackerel met a ready sale at 30 cents each, and mediums 20 cents.

Haddock was down to \$1 and \$1.30 a hundred pounds, large cod \$3.50 to \$4, market cod, \$1.60 to \$1.80 and pollock \$2.30.

MRS. BERNSTEIN ACQUITTED.

CHICAGO, Aug. 26—Mrs. Florence Bernstein was acquitted of killing her husband as he lay sleeping. The verdict was returned after the jury had been out twenty-six hours and after it had announced to the Court that it could not reach an agreement.

The verdict came as a surprise, Mrs. Bernstein's defence was that she could recall none of the happenings immediately preceding or following the shooting.

The verdict was a bitter disappointment to State's Attorney Wayman. Angered, he denounced the jury and said conviction of women murderers would be to have a jury made up entirely or in part of women.

"Women are seldom convicted of murder in this country, even when the evidence is overwhelming," said Mr. Wayman. "Men will not convict the opposite sex of such crimes. The least stained face of a woman defendant unnerve them and destroy their judgment. We must try women slayers by women juries if we would see justice done."

"Only a woman can read a woman's heart, tell when her emotional display is true or false, determine when a lie falls from her lips and when the truth is told. We must amend our jury laws so that the next woman slayer in Chicago shall be tried by women."

Mrs. Catherine Waugh McCulloch, Jane Addams and other Chicago women expressed agreement with Mr. Wayman's opinion. Several expressed a desire to serve on a murder jury.

HYDRO AEROPLANE RACE.

ST. MALO, France, Aug. 24—The first hydro-aeroplane race meeting ever held began here today in the presence of an immense concourse of people from all parts of France and other European countries. The weather was fine and very favorable at the start of the races, in which a considerable number of fliers are entered. The wind, however, blew with sufficient strength to test the nerve of the contestants. The roadstead was crowded with yachts, steamers, war vessels and other craft.

ENGLISH WEATHER CAUSING LOSS.

LONDON, Aug. 27—It is estimated that the wet weather has cost British farmers nearly a hundred million dollars. Unless two fine weeks are had the English harvest will be a total failure. At best the crop will be only fair in quantity and below average in quality. This means big import from across the Atlantic.

Toronto local Catholics are skeptical as to the truth of the report about Archbishop McNeil.

GAMBLING HOUSE IS RAIDED.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27—The gambling house formerly run by Brg. Webber, where the Rosenthal murder is believed to have been planned, was raided early today by the police. Cards and poker chips were confiscated.

PROMINENT MAN PASSES AWAY.

TORONTO, Aug. 27—Frederick Wylde, founder of the firm of Wylde Grassel and Dartege, is dead. He was a director of the Canada Permanent Mortgage Corp., Vice-President of the Standard Bank and Confederation Life Assurance.

ROBBERY BOLDLY PLANNED.

VANCOUVER, August 26—The Bank of Hamilton's branch at Cedar Cottage, five miles from the center of the city, was the scene of a bold robbery, but badly executed, Saturday night at eight o'clock, just as the bank was closing. The desperadoes, armed with masked, numbered six. Four at least are believed to be Italians. Not more than four hundred dollars was the amount of their plunder, this secured from the teller's desk. When Manager T. H. Rhodes pulled the fire alarm, the gang backed out from the bank building, showering bullets on the crowd on the street. Police Constable Winters shot one of the robbers, but his companion carried him to a waiting automobile and escaped. Most of the bullets passed high in the air, but a stray one crashed thru the glass window of a neighboring grocery store and slightly wounded a clerk.

TEST OF ACOUSTICS.

OTTAWA, August 26—A familiar sound was heard today in the house of commons. A western member requested information from the government as to the probable date of prorogation. He wanted to make sure of getting his "worth." He was assured that the close of the session would not be unnecessarily delayed. This debate came out of an old sheet of last session's Hansard and was recited by one Jacob Moser, an acoustical engineer from New York. Hon. F. D. Monk, Minister of Public Works, and J. B. Hunter, the deputy, were among those present. These gentlemen were testing the acoustics of the chamber, following the padding of some of the upper wall surfaces. The acoustics were thought to be improved.

ENGLISH AVIATOR COMING.

CHICAGO, August 26—A cable today from Hendon, England, announced that Claude Graham White, the English aviator, who won the Gordon Bennett world's championship race in Belmont Park, New York, in 1910, will sail within a few days to take part in the Gordon Bennett race in September and in the international aviation meet directly afterwards.

KILLED BY LIVE WIRE.

ST. CATHARINES, Ont., Aug. 27—Edward Day, President of the Trades and Labor Council here, was killed when he pitched aside a live wire knocked to the ground during a storm.

WET WEATHER IN ENGLAND.

LONDON, August 26—This August has been the wettest month known in England for many years. Rain fell every day for three weeks and nearly constantly during the last week. Damage to the crops, particularly hay, has been heavy thru out the United Kingdom.

Ten thousand troops under canvas on Salisbury Plain are nearly flooded. The tents are soaked, floors sag under mud and the surrounding fields are a great swamp.

The railroads in North Wales are partly under water. Passengers are being conveyed between Dolgelly and Barmouth, a distance of seven miles, by motor boats. The river Nen in Northamptonshire is 12 feet above normal and a big flood is threatened at Rundle, a town on the river, with a population of 200,000.

Then followed the hasty flight of the hold-ups.
