RECRUITING.—The North Sydney Herald says:—Surprise is expressed in local circles why some effort is not made to fill up the ranks of the P.E. Island heavy brigade now doing guard duty here, instead of bringing raw recruits from elsewhere. An advertisement in a Charlottetown paper calls for some twenty-two men to fill up the vacancies on the brigade made as a result of some of the boys who were previously stationed here having gone to the front.
