Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may be entitled to a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 30 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect the area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live may be substituted for cultivation under conditions.

It of swift military obedience from their children; but as a rule it is the women who are the determining factor in this question of obedience. The young mother who begins with her tiny babe in its cradle has caught the first secret of success and how precious that habit of instinctive obedience will be to her child only that child in years to come will know.

A young soldier crossing the Atlantic wrote back, "It's come at last and it's been worth all the hard time to get it. I instinctively turn to obey today. I obey where I instinctively disobey in whatever I was told yesterday." A young nurse starting for the front cried out "I'm one of the chosen fifteen to nurse under a leading New York Doctor, a mile from the front, and he has chosen me because he finds I instinctively want to obey."

Secondly "A consciousness of the presence of God." This is caught from the atmosphere of Bible teaching and may be given by the mother at home or by the teacher at school. The question of the need of Bible teaching a century ago weighed heavily upon far seeing statesmen, like Bishop Strachan. It seemed hopeless to stem the sea of forest with a tide of Christianity. Looking out over that same sea, Doctor Strachan said that the hope of the future of Canada lay in the women who of an evening would put aside the spinning wheel and by the light of the piled up log fire, "bring back the consciousness of God to the recollection of their husband and to the attention of their children."

too busy unpacking Mrs. Smith, to be bothered listening to him." But what if we think we have little ability? The man who held back because he had only one talent and wrapped it in a napkin, and buried it in the earth, lost his chance, and was as much blamed by Christ for wasting his power of service as he would have been blamed if he had wasted ten talents. We think we can do so little, and forget that the power is not in our selves but in Christ. The boy by the waterside might have trembled when he found he was being pushed to the front, and that his five loaves and two small fishes were going to feed the great multitude, but as he put them into Christ's hand Christ used them, and no one went away hungry. Thirdly, what if we are young leaders; this instead of being a drawback, gives us the greatest chance of anybody in the world, because the younger we are the longer service we may have for Christ. The little boy at the Christmas tree, where a long candle had been prepared for his grandfather and a little one for him, was right when he pointed to the big candle and cried out it ought to be his because he would go on living and living. The truth is we none of us know till too late what is really much or little. For after all next to the immediate presence of Christ Heaven is what we win out for Christ. Hell is what we lose which we might have gained for Christ. When the chart of our life like the chart of a ship after crossing the Atlantic is one day spread out before us we shall know, for Christ will then show us the turns which we might have made for Him, the men and women, girls and boys we might have won but which through our selfishness and cowardice we have lost. We shall find a hell of remorse as we learn the true issues of life and death, of right and wrong, just as we shall find a Heaven of joy in any turn we have taken for Him. To this service to this "hanging on crosses" in place of walking in easy places we Canadian women are called till "The strife men of earth are marshalled" triumphant before God's face. Thoughts that disturb men most never enter a woman's head. Unless a man is sincere he can never be a hero in his own estimation. Our views of society depend upon whether we are inside or outside.
