Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations
THE sole head of a family or any issue over eighteen years of age, who has a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. Homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after settling homesteaded patent; 30 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years cultivate 20 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reversion in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

P. E. Island Brakeman Instantly Killed
James Frederick Campbell of 924 Mary St., a popular brakeman in the local freight yards of the New York Central Railroad, met a tragic death at 1.10 o'clock this morning, when he slipped and fell between cars he was assisting in shifting and was killed instantly. The accident occurred near Tower 30, just east of the foot of First street. It was very dark there at the time. Mr. Campbell's body was found by Fay D. Ebersperger, yard conductor, after he was reported to be missing by the yard shifting crew. The body lay between two tracks. Death, apparently, was instantaneous. Dr. Walter J. Smith, corner, was called and ordered the remains removed to E. J. Quinn's undertaking parlors, corner John and Bladina streets.

Mr. Campbell was born in Albion, Prince Edward Island, Canada, April 6, 27 years ago, a son of Ewen and Tamber McKendrick Campbell. He served as a policeman at Windsor Station in Montreal for three years prior to his removal to Utica, April. He worked as a switchman in the local freight yards before becoming a brakeman, and was considered a faithful and conscientious employee, enjoying the respect and regard of his employers and associates alike. He was a man of excellent character, genial, wholesome and upright and his shocking death will be learned with keen regret by all who knew him. He was Presbyterian in religion.

CANADIAN WAR LOAN TO ISSUE MARCH 12
Announcement Made by the Finance Minister of Its Launching.

NOTICE TO PUBLISH PROSPECTS.
No New York Issue of Dominion Bonds at Present Time.

OTTAWA, March 5.—The date of the launching of the third Canadian domestic war loan has been definitely fixed for Monday, March 12th of the day. It is expected that the proceeds of that loan will carry the Dominion Government until mid-summer. No details as to the amount or price of the new issue of war bonds will be made public until the prospectus is published. The prospectus will appear in the press, throughout the Dominion, on March 12th, and during the period in which the lists remain open.

In the meantime the preparation of the prospectus for publication in the newspapers and the printing and forwarding of copies of it and of necessary forms to the 3,500 branch banks in Canada, and to the Assistant Receivers-General throughout the Dominion will proceed. That work is one which takes several weeks to complete.

The Minister of Finance has not in view, it is announced, any New York issue of Canadian Government bonds at the present time. Any financing which may be found necessary in the United States will be arranged later in the year.

WARNS THOSE ALLEGED TO BE IMPLICATED IN COMBINES
OTTAWA, March 5.—Canada, to a very large extent, is under the heel of the corporate influence in regard to the necessities of life. Domestic trade is largely throttled by combines and agreements, and there are retail merchants from coast to coast bound hand and foot. The consumer is victimized accordingly and has to pay the price demanded under buying and selling agreements and arrangements.

This is in effect what has been discovered as a result of the investigations which have been taking place during the past few weeks under the cost of living regulations. It may be said, so far as individuals are concerned, that the retail merchants have come out of the preliminary investigations in a very satisfactory light.

Answers Generally Satisfactory.
"Hundreds of written enquiries have been made throughout the country covering many articles, and answers under oath have been received in a great majority of cases and several further oral investigations have been made," said Hon. T. W. Crothers, Minister of Labor, last evening. "Those coming from retail merchants. Those generally, have been quite satisfactory in so far as showing that their prices are not immoderate."

"These inquiries and investigations, however, have revealed a widespread system in active operation of buying and selling agreements and arrangements, long established by manufacturers and jobbers of various foods and forced upon retail merchants, fixing commissions, prices, etc., preventing wholesome competition and freedom in domestic trade, restricting the same and tending to enhanced cost to the consumer."

Parties Are Warned.
"It is believed this system contravenes the provision of the Order-in-Council and the guilty parties, so far as known, are being advised thereof and requested to abandon their objectionable methods and to conform to the law forthwith. And their attention having been thus directed to these illegal practices, it is confidently expected that they will be abandoned to the material advantage of the consumer."

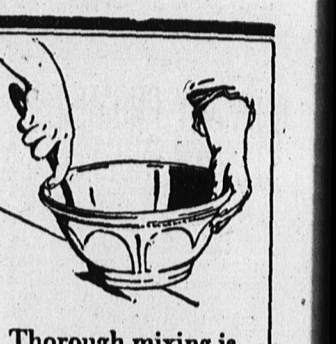
