CAR FERRY MOVEMENTS - The S.S. Prince Edward Island made four round trips before eight o'clock last night. Urges Mining Speed-up

NEW YORK, May 24—(CP)—BBG said today Prime Minister Churchill has called on British miners to make up for a long lag in coal production by redoubling their efforts "in this testing time" when British forces are being massed against the enemy. The broadcast, recorded here by CBS, said that the Prime Minister had praised the way in which miners during the winter, following an appeal he made at a secret meeting with owners and miners representatives last autumn, had closed the gap between production and consumption.

WILL VISIT OTTAWA SHORTLY - Premier Jones expects to visit Ottawa within the next few days, on business connected with transportation and other provincial interests.

BLOOD DONORS' CLUB - The regular quarterly meeting of the Blood Donors' Club of the Charlottetown Hospital was held on May 23, a large number of members being present. The president, Mr. Leo Corvran, presided. The secretary reported that the membership had increased almost fifty percent during the preceding quarter, this being due in large degree to the newly-formed Plasma Bank which is now functioning well there being at all times a considerable quantity on hand. The report cited several emergency cases in which the life of the patient had been saved by the immediate use of the plasma. The meeting was unanimous in its decision to cooperate in any way with the newly-formed Canadian Red Cross Blood Donor Unit in this city and offered to provide donors to this clinic from its membership. On the conclusion of the meeting Dr. J. A. McMillan gave a very interesting and practical demonstration in the laboratory of the separation of plasma from whole blood, explaining how blood is typed and cross matched and how each individual's blood is definitely placed in its own group. He then explained in detail the method used in the collecting and storing of plasma. This demonstration was much appreciated by the members.

School Chums To Receive Decorations

LONDON, May 24—(CP)—Two chums of school days who entered the Royal Canadian Navy together—Lieut. David W. Blair, 26, and Lieut. P. Edmund Jess, 24, both of Quebec City—are to receive decorations from the King at Buckingham Palace for valor while serving in widely separated fields. Before Blair has been awarded the medal of the British Empire for outstanding work in mine disposal work in Britain. Lieut. Jess has earned the Distinguished Service Cross for successful torpedo plane attacks against enemy shipping while serving with the fleet at sea in Malta.

The two young Canadians went to school together in Quebec City, shortly after the war began they were interviewed by Commandant F. A. Price, R.C.N.V.R. officer commanding the reserve division at Quebec, who arranged for them to come to Scotland for training as cadet ratings, on loan to the Royal Navy.

After five months of training their paths separated, Blair going to sea and the volunteering for the fleet air arm. In May 1941 they received their commissions. Blair went to Scotland to take up mine disposal work and his friend sailed for Trinidad for training as an observer in the fleet air arm.

Both enjoyed distinct success. Blair, in a most hazardous occupation, safely disposed of more than 300 mines, which had drifted ashore. Jess went into torpedo plane work and shared in the sinking of six enemy merchant ships while based at Malta.

They corresponded and arranged to meet on leave. In February, 1942, they met in London. Exactly a year later they were again reunited. Now they are to meet again before the King.

They plan to return to Quebec City together, on foreign service leave. L.A.C. Foster Herlihy stationed with the Air Force in Charlottetown spent a few days at his home in Hebron.
