THE LIQUOR AND OPIUM TRADE

McGill of Ontario Bank Pleads Not Guilty and Goes to Jail.

Toronto, Nov. 7.—(Special)—The executive of the Presbyterian Foreign Missionary Society has adopted a resolution urging the Colonial Secretary to take steps for the abolition of the liquor and opium trade by Great Britain.

Ex-Manager McGill of the Ontario Bank on trial in the Police Court pleaded not guilty to the charge of preparing false returns, and theft.

Souris, Nov. 7.—(Special)—The wrecked barque off Priest Pond is the Russian-Finn iron barque Sovindo, lumber-laden from Dalhousie, N. B. to Melbourne, Australia.

There are seven men still on the wreck, three on one portion and four on the other, some distance apart. The ship broke amidships and the centre is carried away.

McGILL'S TRIAL IS NOW ON

Toronto, November 6.—The trial of Charles McGill, ex-general manager of the Ontario bank, began before Magistrate Denison this morning. The most damaging testimony came from Walter Chenoweth, former employee of the bank who testified that under instructions of McGill he had made false entries in the books, these entries to be incorporated in one of the monthly statements.

G. W. FOWLER M.P. HAS A BUSY DAY

Before Insurance Commission, Tells of His Land Deals, Says He Bought and Sold Not as Agent—Is Contradicted By Supreme Councillor of Foresters.

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—(Special)—George W. Fowler, M. P., was before the Insurance Commission this afternoon and evening, and though he declared he had not been able to find the documents demanded and could not remember of whom he had demanded profits on British Columbia timber deals, considerable matter of new interest was discovered.

It appears that Foster was a partner with Fowler and others in the Kamloops Lumber Co., which bought the lumber lands from Mr. Fowler with money put up by the Union Trust Co.

Fowler was a shareholder in the Okanagan Co., which sold its property to the Kamloops Co., at a profit of a hundred percent.

Every effort is being made at court to push up the hands and the argument that the future of her infant son demands that she continue to live with her husband is being pressed upon Princess Margaret. Even the powerful influence of her uncle, King Edward, will be moved to induce the young wife and mother to remain with her husband. But it is not believed that a reconciliation is possible.

Prince Gustavus Adolphus and the Princess Margaret were married in London in June, 1905. The husband and his bride were both 23 years of age. A son was born to the Princess on April 23 of this year.

It was known before that the Princess was anxious to separate from her husband but the birth of the heir to the throne was expected to make a change in the feelings of the Royal couple. The Princess is sick again and is preparing to return to her home in England.
