FUNERAL YESTERDAY.—The funeral of the late Mrs. Strathie, widow of Rev. R. G. Strathie, formerly pastor of Zion Church, Charlottetown and of the Presbyterian congregation, Summerside, took place yesterday afternoon from her home, Upper Prince Street. There was a large attendance including a number of foreign friends from Summerside who came to pay the last tribute of respect to one whom they esteemed very highly. The services at a home and the graveside were conducted by Rev. Dr. Fullerton and Rev. D. McLean. The pall bearers were Messrs D. A. McKinnon, Messrs A. Robertson, Donald McKinnon and D. K. Currie.

EX-SOLDIER'S SAD DEATH.—The death occurred in the Charlottetown hospital yesterday afternoon of Mr. William McDonald, aged 38 years, a former soldier of the 10th Battalion. He came to the city a week or so on his way to Vancouver when he became ill, and developed pneumonia. He was sent to the hospital where he lingered until yesterday. His death was deeply regretted. The funeral was held at the residence of Mr. McDonald, 10th Street, at 10 o'clock and was attended by a number of friends. The remains were taken in charge by the Rev. K. C. Home and will be forwarded this morning to Cardigan for burial at his native place.

CINTYRE-MALLARD.—A notable wedding was the McIntyre-Mallard wedding, which took place in St. Margaret's Church last Wednesday. The groom Mr. James Mallard, though a returned soldier, was a soldier the same, not having gone overseas. The bride, Miss Josephine McIntyre, daughter of late Capt. Daniel McIntyre, for some ten years Road Supervisor of Clear Springs, Lord Government, of Clear Springs, Lot 44, took charming in a suit of Copenhagen blue tulle with overlace, white roses and maiden hair veil. The bridesmaid was Miss Annie McDonald, cousin, also, charmingly dressed, and looking pretty. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Father Pherson, P. I., in the presence of a few friends. The wedding reception as held in the evening at the home of the bride's mother, Mrs. Capt. McIntyre. Friends from far and near, many from the New England States, are present, numbering about one hundred and fifty guests. The spread is sumptuous and refreshments of which few could help doing ample justice to. Dancing was indulged in to the wee sma hours, beginning with the old time "wedding reel." The bride was one of the most popular young ladies was the recipient of many beautiful presents and scores of bouquets amounting to several hundred dollars from her host of friends, both home and abroad. The happy couple will reside in the old McIntyre stead.

After much suffering at the Prince County Hospital from burns caused by the explosion in the Summerside laundry on Tuesday afternoon Miss Irene Ahearn and Mr. John Dobson passed away Wednesday morning. Miss Ahearn was burned badly on the face hands and body and suffered much from the gasoline fumes breathed into her lungs. She passed away at 1 o'clock yesterday morning. Deceased was only 24 years of age. He was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Ahearn and had only been employed at her work in the Laundry for two months. Besides her sorrowing parents there were left to mourn two sisters, Mrs. H. R. Schurman, Summerside and Miss Margaret Ahearn, of Charlottetown and two brothers, James, recently returned from France, and William, of Darnmouth, N. S. The funeral takes place this morning at 10 o'clock. To the bereaved sincere and heartfelt sympathy is extended. Mr. Dobson was also very badly burned about the face, hands and neck and passed away yesterday morning. His sufferings was intense but he bore it with his usual cheerfulness notwithstanding all that could be done to help to relieve the pain he could not recover and passed away at 11 a. m.

In the death of Mr. Dobson, Summerside has lost one of its most prominent and highly respected citizens and those who knew him best will sincerely mourn his passing. As a citizen and business man he took a keen interest in every movement made for the welfare of the town. He had a kind and cheerful word for everyone and enjoyed the confidence of all. The deceased was proprietor and owner of the Summerside Laundry, which was destroyed by the explosion, for the past 20 years. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Dobson and was born in Seaside town 69 years ago. He leaves to mourn besides a sorrowing widow, formerly Miss Eliza Bowens, one daughter, Lillian also one brother, Daniel Dobson, St. John, N. B., four sisters, Mrs. D. W. Chicks, Portland Maine, Mrs. J. S. Allan, Summerside, and Miss Mary and Miss Caroline Dobson, also of Summerside. One brother, the late Rev. William Dobson for some time pastor of the First Methodist Church, Charlottetown, predeceased him. To the bereaved sincere and heartfelt sympathy is extended in their sad loss.

His many friends will be very sorry to know that Lieut. Villard is in delicate health and is at present under treatment at the Sanatorium at Kentville, N.S.

NUPTIALS.—A very pretty wedding took place in St. James church, Freetown on July 15th, when Miss Ella McCarville, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Francis McCarville was united in marriage to Mr. Charles Bennett Delghan, of Bradalbane. The ceremony was performed by Rev. W. McDonald, of Charlottetown. The bride was becomingly attired in white georgette crepe over white duchess of satin with pearl trimmings and wore a gift of the groom. The bride was attended by her cousin Miss Mary Murphy, who wore grey georgette crepe over old rose silk, and the groom was ably supported by his brother Russell. After the ceremony was performed the bridal party motored to the early morning train and crossed by the Car ferry. In the evening they returned to the home of the bride, where the family members of both bride and groom were present. A jolly good time was spent, until day dawned when all departed to their homes, wishing Mr. and Mrs. Delghan many long years of happy wedded life.

MISSIONARY CONFERENCE.—Rev. R. H. Stavert of Hunter River, returned on Saturday evening from Wolfville, N. S., where he had been attending the Missionary Conference held July 22-29. This conference is held under the auspices of the Missionary Education movements and is open to all denominations. There were upwards of 120 delegates present from different parts of the Maritime Provinces. The teachers were Rev. Dr. Falconer, Pine Hill College, Halifax, Rev. C. P. Best, Toronto, Rev. D. G. These men will probably arrive tonight. A sad and very regrettable fatality occurred in Charlottetown yesterday when George Ward, the six year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Ward, Bishop Street met with his death as the result of being run into by an automobile.

The little fellow in company with another was on Elm Avenue when they saw an ice wagon passing slowly by. They asked the driver for a little bit of ice and reached into the rear of the wagon to get it. The first boy to take a bit walked to the sidewalk safely and the little Ward chap was on his way across the street with his hand and did not notice an automobile approaching very close behind him. The auto it is said, was not moving very fast at the time and under the circumstances of the case the accident was apparently unavoidable.

The boy was knocked down but was able to get up again and walked about twenty yards towards his home when he fell and was picked up and carried home and a physician summoned who ordered the child to be sent to the hospital. He was conscious up to within a few minutes of his death which occurred about 2.40. His injuries were internal, the only external sign of the accident being a scar on the side of his head.

The automobile which struck the child was driven by Mr. Walter Donette of Rustico who feels very badly over the matter and at once gave in his name and number of car. Much sympathy is felt for the parents and other members of the family in the sorrow which they have been called upon so unexpectedly to bear. An inquest was held last evening at the house of Dr. McGuigan acting as coroner in the absence of Dr. McMillan. The jury was composed of the following: D. J. McNeill, (Foreman.) George Williams John Van Buskirk, Fred Chandler, Humphrey Arthur, John Martin, Arthur Vatcher. The evidence of Mr. Walter Donette and several boys who witnessed the accident was taken. The inquest however was not concluded and was adjourned for further evidence until this evening in the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court Room at 8 o'clock.

Yesterday was Declaration Day for Queens County. Messrs. Crosby, Kennedy, Hughes, LePage, Nash, Irving, Higgs and Duffy were declared elected by the Returning Officer, Mr. Henry Smith.

The Court of Declaration adjourned until Monday next at 10 a.m. on account of want of official statements in two returning offices in the Third District.

The evidence of six witnesses was taken. The verdict pronounced was "accidental death, and no negligence attributed to the driver of the automobile according to the evidence."

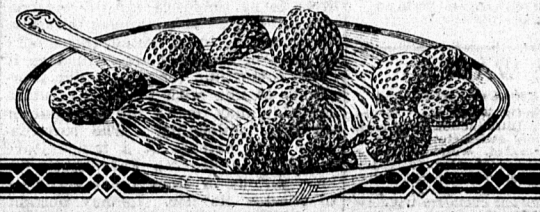

There passed away on the 17th inst at the residence of his nephew, A. E. Holland, Albany, Augustus E. C. Holland at the advanced age of 95 years. His uncle, Col. John F. Holland was the first British subject born on P. E. Island. His father was Frederick Abraham Holland, and his grandfather was Major Samuel Holland, Surveyor General. In religious faith Mr. Holland was a member of the Church of England. His body was laid to rest in the Belecque Cemetery. Mr. Holland was born in Tryon and completed his education in Quebec. After school he began business as a merchant at Tryon and after some seven years took up farming in Searletown. He began his political career before confederation and was elected then on the Conservative ticket to the Legislature. He was several times re-elected and was first defeated by the present Premier, John H. Bell. He had been twice married when on July 2, 1898 he was again married to Mrs. Annie Page, (nee Huestis.) Mrs. Holland is now residing at Parshoro, N. S. It was in 1904 that Mr. Holland removed from the Island to Wallace, N. S., returning but two weeks before he passed away. Having been identified with the Island's history for almost a century both in politics and business, Mr. Holland will be remembered by many for the active and important part he took in public affairs.
