TEACHERS' SALARIES

In a former letter we pointed out the fact that the great majority of our teachers remain in the profession but a very short time. Year after year we have a changing staff of teachers, with all the evils of interrupted continuity in the work and methods. Every year twenty percent of our teachers are without previous experience. What is the cause of this condition, and what is its cure?

In any study of our schools it will be instructive to keep before us their cost as compared with the cost of education in the other provinces.

The total cost of publicly conducted schools per head of population (based on 1921) in the several provinces according to the latest figures obtainable, was as follows:

It appears from the foregoing that our province makes the worst showing in Canada as regards the expenditures per head of population per head of pupils enrolled and per head of pupils in average daily attendance.

EDITORS MEET.—The Eastern Trust Company is appointed Trustee in Bankruptcy of Benjamin Clow, General Merchant, Murray Harbor North. The first meeting of creditors of Benjamin Clow took place in the Law Courts Building, Charlottetown. The meeting was attended by several local merchants while a number of the outside creditors were represented by MacKinnon & McGill, J. D. Stewart, K. C., G. S. Inman, K. C., MacLeod and Bentley, and other solicitors. Charles H. Chandler, J. P. Gordon, of Moore & McLeod's, and J. D. Stewart, solicitor, were appointed trustees of the estate, and the Eastern Trust Company appointed as Trustee. It is understood that the stock in trade at present in Mr. Clow's general store at Murray Harbor will be sold by tender as well as a quantity of lobster equipment owned by the assignor. The store building is involved in a Chancery suit which has been in process for several years, but it is understood that an application will be made to the Courts for permission to dispose of it for the benefit of the creditors.

To Increase Steamship Service To The Island

Additional steamboat service between Prince Edward Island and the mainland and a number of other matters were before the Council of the Charlottetown Board of Trade Saturday afternoon. Communications had been sent to the Merchants and Miners Transportation Company of Baltimore, the Eastern Steamship Company, and the Clyde Steamship Company relative to services between New York, Boston, Halifax and Charlottetown. The messages sent at a previous meeting were referred to and a reply was read from the first mentioned company asking for statistics and data regarding tourist traffic, hotel rates, freight possibilities, and subsidy prospects, etc.

The Clyde Steamship Company of New York said that when they were making up their summer schedule they would give the matter of a boat to the Island serious consideration.

Mr. H. F. McPhee, Chairman of the Transportation Committee, read a letter which had been sent to the Merchants and Miners Transportation Company in reply to their wire as to the possibility of passenger and freight traffic. On motion a copy of the letter was ordered to be sent to the Tourist Association.

The Secretary read correspondence with Mr. Tompkins, Traffic Manager of the C. N. Railways, regarding rates of various commodities. Mr. Tompkins said he preferred to have a personal conference, suggested holding this when Hon. Mr. Lea would return from England. This was approved.

A letter was read from the Associated Boards of Trade from Cape Breton relative to the securing of more equitable rates on coal, as it was contended that the Cape Breton coal shippers are being discriminated against.

The communication from the Halifax Board of Trade asking to have legislation re bulk sales act passed in Prince Edward Island, so as to be in line with the other provinces was referred to Mr. H. F. McPhee, who will report at the next meeting.

A lengthy letter was read from Mr. S. R. Gordon, Ottawa, acting on behalf of the Micmac Transportation Company, Limited, submitting a proposition to establish a freight and passenger service between Sydney, Mulgrave, Port Elgin, and other points. Mr. Gordon said a steamer was being purchased in Glasgow and was coming out under her own steam, that the proposition was endorsed by the Senators and Members of Parliament of the Board of Trade to endorse the matter and also write Hon. James Malcolm, Minister of Trade and Commerce. A resolution was passed strongly endorsing the proposition.

would be able to solve any problem which would arise in this connection.

His Worship then made a most sympathetic reference to the death of Dr. Warburton. For three successive terms he had held the position of Mayor of the city. Not only this, but he had represented the city in the provincial legislature for a number of years. "I know we are all in fullest accord," said His Worship in conclusion "when we extend to his relations our most sincere sympathy."

On the reports of the various standing committees being called for, the chairman, Councillors Prowse, Foster, MacLeod, MacDougall, Dougan, Holman, Kennedy, and Reardon extended their congratulations to His Worship on his election.

The Police Report was then read by the City Clerk. Its acceptance was moved by Councillor Holman and seconded by Councillor Prowse, who complimented the Chief of Police on the completeness and general excellence of his report.

DEVOS TO GET A BOUT WITH MICKEY WALKER

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—The heavyweight elimination bout between Jack Delaney of Bridgeport, Conn., and Tom Heeney of New Zealand, scheduled for 15 rounds in Madison Square Gardens March 1, was approved yesterday by the New York State Athletic Commission.

Jimmy McLarnin, Pacific Coast lightweight, and his manager, Pop Lighter, appeared before the Commission to post \$2,500 as forfeit money for weight and appearance Feb. 24, the date McLarnin is to meet Sid Terris in the Garden. Terris will post his forfeit later.

Rene De Vos, Belgian middleweight, filed a challenge to Mickey Walker, middleweight champion basing his claim on the fact that he defeated George Courtney, Oklahoma cowboy, in Philadelphia Monday night. Courtney previously had been recognized as the leading title in this state. The Commission probably will recognize De Vos' challenge.

Jack McKenna, North Sydney, hard-hitting middleweight and considered by newspapers to be the leading fighter of his class in Canada, fought Devos 10 fast and grueling rounds in Halifax, N. S. last November, McKenna, although just out of his teens and practically inexperienced had the Belgian in a bad way in the fifth and tenth rounds of the memorable battle.

AIR MAIL SERVICE.—Mr. E. J. Underwood, Chief Post Office Superintendent arrived in the City last Saturday night from Ottawa. His business here is in connection with the proposed Air Mail Service from Moncton to Charlottetown. He left yesterday morning for Moncton and Saint John. While here he consulted with Post Office Inspector Whear and Postmaster Callaghan on the local situation, and as a result it is expected that in the near future, a week-end air service will be established from Moncton to Charlottetown and return, the mails being landed at Charlottetown between 2 and 3 p. m. in order that the same may be delivered to our citizens by letter carrier service on Saturday afternoon and mails for points east and south be enabled to catch the afternoon trains for these districts. A return mail will be taken to the mainland to make connections with the Maritime Express Saturday night at Moncton. Our harbor makes a splendid landing place for the aeroplane. After striking the ice, it will require a run of fully one mile to bring the plane to a stop and the present intention is that it will land the mails close to the west end of Richmond Street, where there is always a good landing for teams.

THE LATE MRS. BENJAMIN C. PROWSE

The death of Mrs. Benjamin C. Prowse, wife of Senator Prowse, occurred on Sunday evening at her home on Dorchester Street. She was the youngest daughter of the late Mr. George W. Milner, who in his time was one of our best known citizens.

Mrs. Prowse had, for some time, been in failing health, and not long ago it became evident to those who loved her that her life was rapidly drawing to its close in spite of all that could be done by tender care and medical skill.

She will be mourned by a wide circle of friends and acquaintances in this city, where her influence was always for that which would benefit the community in which she lived, both as a member of Trinity United Church, and as a devoted wife and mother.

Her mother was a sister of General Lew Wallace, American diplomat, lawyer and writer, who is perhaps, best known as the author of that great novel, Ben Hur.

From her and from her father who was a man of far more than usual ability, she inherited a brilliant intellect, and attainments much more than ordinary.

She leaves to cherish her memory her husband, and a family of three, George in Boston; Carl and Maud (Mrs. Preston MacLaine). To her bereaved relatives The Guardian extends its deepest sympathy.
