## MR. WISE'S ADDRESS.

Mr. Joseph Wise, who was recently expelled from the Legislature, has issued an address to his former constituents in the Second District of Queens. In this address he gives his version of the circumstances attending his resignation and ejection. The substance of his statement in regard to his resignation is as follows: Having been elected as a Liberal and having reached the conclusion that he ought not longer to support the Government of the day, being also told by some of his electors that he ought to resign, he determined to do so.

He thereupon met Mr. Farquharson and told him of his desire to resign upon one condition, that an election should be held before the meeting of the Legislature. To this condition he says Mr. Farquharson consented, and signed a writing to that effect. The resignation and written promise were left with Mr. Farquharson on February 28th. On March 3rd Mr. Farquharson told Mr. Wise that a word had been omitted from the resignation and desired another. Mr. Wise consented and in Mr. Newberry's office a new resignation was written out and signed by Mr. Wise. The Premier's written promise was spoken of at the time, and Mr. Wise, understanding that Mr. Farquharson intended to destroy it, insisted that both the resignation and the promise should go together. To this, Mr. Wise says, Mr. Farquharson consented and both documents were left with Mr. Newberry. About a week later the resignation was sent to the Speaker and the Premier's promise was taken by Mr. Farquharson from Mr. Newberry, and he still holds it.

The Speaker promptly notified the Lieutenant Governor, and the latter, about the 12th of March ordered a writ for the election to be issued, on which order a writ was duly made out, leaving certain blanks to be filled up, and from that day nothing further has been done.

So far we have given the substance of Mr. Wise's statement which contains one or two details not before given to the public. The statement that Mr. Farquharson's alleged promise to bring on the election was withdrawn from Mr. Newberry's hands without Mr. Wise's consent, and also the statement that a writ was ordered to issue two months ago, without an election having since been held, seem to call for a denial, explanation or counter-statement from the Leader of the Government. They can hardly be passed over in silence. Our independent and impartial readers will no doubt suspend their judgement until the Premier has had an opportunity to give his version of the story.

It appears that Mafeking has food enough to make it possible for the garrison to hold out till June 10th. This is much better than had been expected. On the other hand the brave garrison had a very narrow escape from capture by assault on the 7th instant in which the enemy actually obtained a foothold in the Kaffir quarter of the town, but were afterwards repulsed. So narrow was the escape that it now appears the Boer general Snyman actually reported to Pretoria, prematurely, that he had captured the town, making Baden Powell and 900 other prisoners.

The burning of the power house of the water works is a very serious matter with an air of mystery about it. The building was of brick with slate roof and concrete floor. It was believed to be fire proof. The fullest and most searching inquiry should be made in order to ascertain the cause. If it was accidental we might learn therefrom how to prevent a recurrence. If the fire was the work of an incendiary the act was one of such atrocious wickedness that scarcely any punishment would be too great for the perpetrator, who wantonly placed the town in peril of destruction.

We direct attention to the extract published this morning from Hon. Mr. Sinclair's speech dealing with our road service. There is too much reason to believe, as he states that of the \$30,000 including the commutation money, annually expended on the roads nearly or quite one third is as bad as wasted. We agree with Mr. Sinclair in thinking it probable that under the plan he proposes the roads might be kept in as good or better condition at two thirds of the present cost. Mr. Sinclair is not a frequent speaker and carefully avoids taking up time needlessly, but when he speaks he has something of value to say.

It transpires that when by the destruction of the power house the city's supply of water was suddenly cut off there was but little water in the reservoir and this is said to be the usual condition, owing to the fact that the reservoir leaks badly when more than half full. Under such conditions what would have been the consequence had a fire broken out with the high wind of yesterday afternoon blowing? Now that we are safely past the greatest peril of the moment let us be thankful, that the worst did not happen. But by all means let the reservoir and the fire engines be kept in order.
