Reception to Papal Delegate at St. Mary's Church, Souris

On Friday, July 6th, the parishioners of St. Mary's Parish, Souris, were singularly honored by the visit of the Papal Delegate, and they extended a magnificent welcome to His Excellency, the Most Reverend Andrea Cassulo, Archbishop of Leopoldopolis and Delegate Apostolic to Canada and Newfoundland. The official representative of the Holy Father was accompanied by His Lordship Bishop O'Leary, Rt. Rev. Maurice McDonald, D. P., and a number of the Clergy, who were the guests at a banquet given for the occasion at the Parochial residence by Rt. Rev. J. C. McLean.

At 7 p. m. vested in Cappa-Magna and preceded by the Altar Boys and Clergy, the Papal Delegate marched from the parochial residence and proceeded between the two lines of Convent Children attired in white costume and veils, the various Parish Societies and people, and made the Solemn Entry into the Church, where he was received by the Pastor, Rt. Rev. J. C. McLean, P.A.V.G. When His Excellency had taken his seat upon the throne, Rt. Rev. J. C. McLean read to him the following address of welcome on behalf of the parishioners:

To His Excellency, Most Reverend Andrea Cassulo, D. D. Delegate Apostolic to Canada and Newfoundland.

May it Please Your Excellency: The Catholic people of St. Mary's Parish, Souris, are singularly honored today. It is our great privilege to receive Your Excellency, as you arrive on this, your first official visit to the Diocese of Charlottetown. We hasten to bid you welcome and we cannot refrain from feeling a just and laudable pride that it is our happy lot to have the opportunity of extending to you a heartfelt greeting.

Above all other considerations in life we treasure the priceless gift of our Catholic faith. We hold with unswerving loyalty to the traditions of our Holy Religion, and for this reason we regard it as no idle boast to say that we yield to no people in the warmth of our attachment to the Holy See. We, therefore, rejoice in your coming, for we recognize in you the golden tie that binds us to the chair of Peter, and in your presence we seem to feel upon our cheeks the warm breath of Rome, fragrant with its memories of nineteen hundred years.

But, not for this alone are we happy today. Apart from the sentiments that faith inspires, we feel what a blessing it is for the Church in Canada that her welfare is in your keeping. We fully realize the far reaching consequences of the prudence and tact that you bring in the discharge of the duties of your high office, and we all experience a blissful sense of security in the thought that all will be well with the Canadian Church under your wise and skillful guidance.

Even before your arrival in this country we have watched your career with special interest. As Delegate to Egypt and Arabia you have greatly enhanced the prestige of God's Church, and succeeded in uniting in her name people of various rites and races with mutual understanding and sympathy. We have seen you solve delicate and difficult problems by a happy combination of tact and justice, and admired the gentle willingness with which you gave the prestige of your presence to enhance the splendor of public movements in the interests of religion; and we feel confident that the kindness of your heart and the exquisite charm of your manner will open for the Church in Canada a bright era of religion prosperity.

Thankful, then, that Almighty God has sent you to us and proud of your past achievements in the Church, we bid you a cordial welcome.

Repose with us for a time in the calm assurance that you are amongst a people whose hearts are yours in veneration and love. We pray that your days may be long in "this Canada of ours" wherein opportunities abound to accomplish so much good for our Holy Religion, and when at last you retire from your present office may it be in obedience to the voice of authority calling you to higher honors.

His Excellency replied very fittingly expressing his appreciation of the reception tendered him as the Official Representative of the Holy Father. In words of touching earnestness he voiced the happiness that was his to visit the people of the Parish, whose words of love and veneration for the Holy Father filled his heart with joy, he then imparted "simpliciter modo" the Papal Blessing.

Pontifical Benediction was celebrated by His Excellency assisted by Rev. K. C. McPherson, Deacon, Rev. F. L. Mullally, Sub-Deacon, Rev. M. Monaghan, Master of Ceremonies and Rev. L. Dougan, assistant Master of Ceremonies. His Lordship Bishop O'Leary was present in the Sanctuary assisted by Rt. Rev. J. C. McLean, P.A.V.G. and Rt. Rev. Maurice McDonald, D. P. Seated in the Sanctuary were also Rev. Fathers A. J. McIntyre, P. J. Hogan, R. J. McDonald, A. E. Sinnott, Patrick Walsh, L. P. Callaghan, D. D., J. F. Chapais, S. J.; Joseph Paquet, O. S. A., and Bert Mullally. The Church and Convent grounds were beautifully decorated for the occasion and the interior of the Church presented a spectacle of appealing loveliness. From the choir to the top of the main altar, the papal insignia and colors clung to the walls and pillars, floated gently

from ingeniously concealed fixtures and entwined themselves into arrangements of surpassing beauty. The work was in charge of Mr. D. F. Lavie, assisted by Messrs. James St. John, Plus Cheverie, Arthur Paquet, Edward Moynagh and Ernest St. John, who spared either time nor labor to make their work a success. The Sanctuary and Main Altar were tastefully decorated with votive lights, cut flowers, and potted plants by the Reverend Sisters of St. Mary's Convent.

The Choir under the direction of Dr. A. A. McDonald rendered the following musical program: Antiphon—"Sacredus et Pontifex" and "Ecce Sacerdos Magnus" "Ave Maris Stella". "Ave Venum"—Duet, Dr. A. A. McDonald and J. E. Moynagh. "Tantum Ergo"—J. Wegand, Choir.

"Laudate." March ("The King's March") Sydney H. Gambrell. Before leaving on return to Charlottetown His Excellency accompanied by His Lordship the Bishop and Rt. Rev. J. C. McLean paid a short visit to St. Mary's Convent, the great educational institution of the Province and imparted to the Reverend Sisters the Papal Blessing.

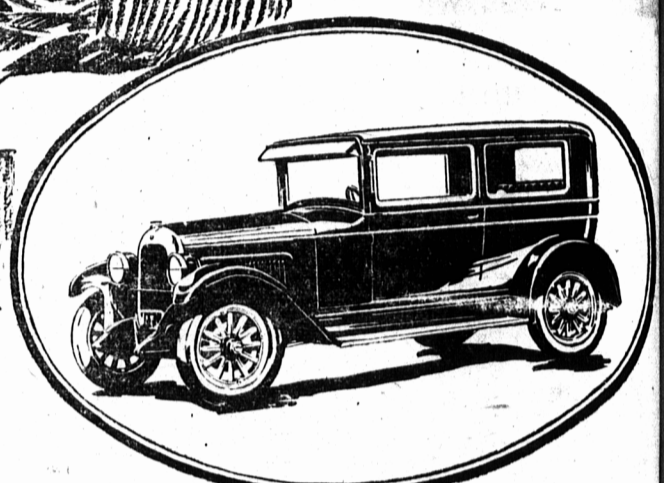
